inhabitants of these islands are a small
part are plunged into grief at the sudden
passing away of the President, and we
condole with Mrs. Harding and other
members of the deceased President's
family, and with our fellow citizens of
the mainland in the common affliction
sustained in the loss which occurs at a
time when the national interests of the
country can least afford the shock.President Warren Gamaliel Harding
the 29th President of the The United
States of America, was born November 2,
1855, was a graduate of the Ohio Central
College, and Editor and owner of the
"Marion Star" which grew wonderfully
in his hands. He was married in 1891
and is survived by his widow, there being
no offspring. The president was a Re-
publican in politics, as we all know, and
was elected President of the Republic in
November 1920, assuming office on March
4, 1921. He has served the country
as Chief Executive just over 3 years.There are events in the President's
official life which have concentrated
much attention of the nation and the
world on Washington. Among the achi-
vements in world diplomacy that will
be long remembered is the limitation of
armament agreement concluded between
the United States, Great Britain, Japan
and France whereby naval competition
will be discontinued for a time at least and
peace conditions better assured among
the powerful nations of the earth.As regards what is brought out in the
contribution published in this issue rela-
tive to a New York committee desiring
to effect a fairer opportunity for children
attending school in the Virgin Islands, we
are constrained to say that this alone in-
dicates the grossest ignorance of Virgin
Island affairs since there is absolutely
no preference shown in the schools here,
all pupils, regardless of color or social
standing being accorded the self same
chance, and placed on exactly the same
footing. The people in New York who
are bothering themselves so much about
the affairs of these islands are simply
exposing themselves to ridicule when
they air such nonsensical and groundless

journs In Disorder.**Mr. Samuel Jackson Makes Statement
That Arouses Anger of Members Who
Failed To Understand.An organization here known as the
Congressional Council whose members
are trained to judge all matters relative
to the Virgin Islands by what they read
in two local papers of St. Croix and St.
Thomas, and who are told that other
newspapers are of the "Judas" and
"white oppressors" type, broke all re-
cords on Sunday afternoon, July 15th,
when they expelled Mr. Samuel Jackson
from their rooms.This organization conducts its meetings
strictly according to Roberts Parliamen-
tary Manual, and only disregard these
rulings when anything displeases the
Dictator whose position is similar to that
of a President or Chairman.
