#### OBITUARY.

The funeral of Miss A. R. Summersill took place at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, the burial service being performed by the Revds. M. Wolter and P. Bartels of the Moravian Church, of which the deceased had been a faithful worker, and in the private cemetery of which her remains were laid to rest. There were numerous floral contributions on this sorrowful occasion, as choice as profuse, and conspicuous among these was a wreath of special beauty tendered by the teachers of the Communal Schools. All the town schools had closed for the first half of the day to permit of the teachers and scholars attending the funeral and it was a host

of friends and acquaintances that turned out to pay the last respects to one who always enjoyed a wide popularity in all circles, through the pleasant personality and interest in beneficent movements among which may be mentioned her connection with the Ladies' Association in this town, an organization which reaches many worthy, indigent persons and which might have sunk out of existence, but for Miss Summersill's ardent and untiring interest. Many have lost a friend in the deceased, and the dumb creatures too, a benefactor, her attachment to dogs and horses forming quite a chapter in her useful life which was not merely a much occupied existence, but an animated career in which she had and used the opportunity both inside and outside of her professional vocation as teacher, of doing a great deal for the uplift and education of a large majority of the young men and women of this community.

#### OFFICIAL NEWS.

September 26, 1919.

On account of the large quantities of gasoline, oil, lumber, and other inflammable material stored in the Navy Yard, Hassel Island, Governor Oman has issued an order to the effect that smoking in the Navy Yard by officers or enlisted men except in their quarters is prohibited and violations of the order will be dealt with by disciplinary measures. Employees smoking in the Navy Yard will be immediately discharged; persons not employees smoking in the Navy Yard will be immediately compelled by the proper authorities in charge to leave the reservation.

The installation in St. Thomas of the new battery near the flag pole of the Marine Barracks has been practically completed, the two guns comprising the battery will be tested out the latter part of this week or the early part of next week, when two or three shots from each gun will be fired two or three times. The public should not confuse this testing of the guns with the usual hurricane signals.

The U. S. S. Kittery sailed from Charlestown, S. C., yesterday at noon and is due to arrive at St. Thomas on or about October 6th.

At a meeting of the St. Thomas Harbor Board, yesterday afternoon, the suggestion that a charge be made for use of buoys for mooring purposes was considered. The Board held that all facilities should be afforded vessels arriving at the port and without cost as far as possible.
