

Aldermen, but only two labour candidates were returned, the remaining seats being won by the rate payers protection association candidates.

London, Nov. 22nd.—Murder started through the streets of Dublin yesterday and at nightfall the meagre reports received here indicated that at least twenty-five persons had been killed and upwards of 100 more or less were seriously wounded. Today's disorders which added an appalling chapter to the tragedy that has been enacted in Ireland for the past several months, began with the deliberate shooting of fourteen men who for the most part were military officers.

London, Nov. 22nd.—Sir Hamar Greenwood was in conference during the morning with members of the cabinet in preparation for the expected bringing up in Parliament today of yesterday's Irish happenings. Nationalist members it is understood were prepared to move an adjournment of the house in order to rescue an opportunity for a full debate on the situation.

Paris, Nov. 22nd.—The French Government will oppose by physical force the return of former King Constantine to the Greek throne, which the Foreign Office now regards as inevitable, the Associated Press was informed today. The French policy which Premier Leygues will advocate at his meeting with Mr. Lloyd George, it was said, would be that a joint note be sent to the Greek people pointing out to them very strongly the consequences of ex-King Constantine's restoration, prominent among which would be the withdrawal of all financial and economical support of Greece. The Foreign Office is convinced that the plebiscite to be held on the question of ex-King Constantine's return will be overwhelmingly in favour of that proposition and this has caused a change in the French attitude.

Warsaw, November 22nd.—Negotiations looking to a permanent peace between Soviet Russia and Poland have been broken off by the former at Riga, where the delegates have been in conference.

London, Nov. 22nd.—Every ward in the city of Dundee and every parish in Kinrosshire have voted for no change in the present liquor licensing system.

Belgrade, Nov. 22nd.—Prince Regent Alexander of Jugo-Slavia has ratified the treaty of Rapallo, settling the Adriatic question between Italy and Jugo-Slavia, it was announced today. The Royal assent to the treaty was given on Sunday.

London, Nov. 22nd.—An evening paper tonight announces that Lord Willingdon, Governor of Madras, will be the Viceroy of India.

New York, Nov. 22nd.—There was no change in the local sugar market early today and Cuba's were available at 4½c. cost and freight, equal to 5.76 for centumugal, despite the report that the

President of Cuba was to urge embargo on old crop sugar. Refined was quiet and unchanged at 9.00 9.50 for fine granulated. Sugar features opened a little higher on covering prompted by the embargo reports, although trading was not active. At noon prices were 8 to 10 points higher.

San Juan, Nov. 24th.—The S. S. "Philadelphia" of the "Red D. Line", due on Monday, arrived this noon. Fire was discovered at 1 a. m. on Saturday but owing to the smoke unable to get at the fire which started in the mail. The compartment was filled with water. The greater part of the mail was destroyed, some being saved, but damaged. Part of the cargo destroyed and ship damaged. The extent of damage still unknown.

MEMORIAL COMMISSION WILL HAVE BUSY TIME.

Lieut. Governor Channing H. Cox of Massachusetts, Governor elect who will succeed Governor Coolidge on Jan. 1st., Mrs. Cox, Mrs. Calvin Coolidge, wife of the Vice President elect, and a party including about 20 in all, representing the state of Massachusetts, arrived on the Mohawk on Thursday to participate in the dedication of a tablet to the memory of the soldiers of the Sixth Massachusetts Infantry who died in Porto Rico in 1898. Attorney

Genl. Allen, Gen. Charles K. Darling the Adjutant General of the state and his staff, and veterans of the Sixth Regiment composed the party.

The party was met at the steamship by a committee composed of Col. George R. Shanton, Commander of the Spanish War veterans in Porto Rico, Frank Adams, A. S. Menendez Haydon L. Moore, Salvador Mestre, Dr. Jose E. Diaz, Dr. W. F. Lippitt, Leopoldo Feliu, Noah Shepherd, Francis H. Dexte, and Harry F. Besosa. From the ship the visitors were taken to the Condado Hotel.

The memorial tablet, which is to be placed in the main corridor of the Federal Building will be dedicated on Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Although there may be some changes in the program due to the fact that the steamer was to have arrived on Wednesday evening the program as announced by the committee on arrangements provided for a call on the Governor and other officials yesterday morning with reception from 4 to 6 o'clock in the afternoon at Casa Blanca by Col. M. S. Jarvis and Mrs. Jarvis. Last night there was a reception and ball at the Porto Rico Casino.

This morning at 10 o'clock the visitors were scheduled to leave on a motor trip over the island spending the night at Coamo Spring.

Saturday there will be a luncheon at Guanica Central. In 1898 the Massachusetts troops landed at Guanica harbor. Saturday night the party will be entertained at the Club Deportivo in Ponce.

Sunday the visitors will go to Adjuntas and Utuado and there will be a pig roast at the latter place. Sunday evening the visitors will return to San Juan.

Monday afternoon the dedication ceremony will be held at 3 o'clock and in the evening the Elks will entertain with a smoker.

Tuesday the visitors will be the guests of the Rotary Club at luncheon and in the evening the Governor and Mrs. Yager will give a reception in their honor.
