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thought of the latter. The French view is that the return of the Crown Prince, the threatened return of the ex-Kaiser and the protection which the Allies are demanding for their military control mission in Germany, are all connected in forming really three different phases of the same question, that they ought to be treated together, and that unless the Germans are made to understand that the Allies are determined that all the clauses of the treaty must be respected, there is no hope of obliging them to execute any part of the treaty.

London, Nov. 15th.—The House of Commons tonight, after a debate in which the Prime Minister and Mr. Lloyd George took part and much heckling and derisive remarks were indulged, rejected the Labour movement of censure introduced by Mr. J. Ramsey MacDonald, by a vote of 285 to 190, amid ministerial cheers. The Government thus maintained its parliamentary majority and cleared for formal dissolution tomorrow, when the struggle, which already bears evidence of being an exceptionally determined character, will be transferred from the Parliament to the Constituence. Ministers and members alike will distribute themselves all over the country, where a great oratorical campaign is already in full swing. Mr. Baldwin today told the House of Commons something about his tariff plans and the reasons for precipitating a general election. He was specific regarding only what he proposes to exclude from taxation, that is, wheat, flour and meat, including mutton and bacon, cheese, butter and eggs. For everything else the Prime Minister reserves "a perfectly free hand" for later decision. On what articles he proposes to raise the tariffs he awaits the advice of a committee appointed to consider the subject. His plea of necessity for protection was based largely on the argument, that, in the matter of tariff, every nation's hand is against Great Britain. Several nations, especially the United States, Italy and Spain, had greatly increased tariffs since the war. Mr. Baldwin's speech was in no sense an oration. He gave the House a perfectly plain talk on foreign affairs, which under the excitement of the impending campaign are almost forgotten. He said the Allies had been informed that the British people could not continue indefinitely to maintain the spirit necessary for cooperation under the existing situation and he deplored the failure to accomplish anything without American cooperation. Mr. Lloyd George replied briefly, criticising the Government's policy in calling a general election. He maintained that a settlement in Europe would be a better remedy for unemployment than tariffs and regretted that the government had dropped international negotiations just when the United States had

joined with Great Britain in them. The debate was started by J. Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the Opposition, who offered a vote of censure of the Government. Mr. MacDonald said that over a third of the unemployed were from the engineering and other metal trades, and shipbuilding, cotton and distributing trades. The engineering and iron and steel trades in the first nine months of 1923 had imported goods to the value of 19,000,000 pounds and exported to the amount of 94,000,000 pounds. Tariffs reform in such conditions offered no help for the unemployed. Bribing agriculture with 11,000,000 pounds annually, he asserted was of doubtful legality.
