THE MARKED BILL.

Quite frequently in the past this paper has brought to the attention of its readers how much it means to this or any town for its people to do all, or as much as possible, of its dealing at home.

Redcliff should be in a comparatively flourishing condition at the present time. Two of our industries are working night and day and two others, although not running at full capacity, are in operation. There is not an idle man in town, and all things being considered, we have a very substantial monthly pay roll.

Of course we know that a very unfortunate state of affairs exists in that a large percentage of the laborers employed are foreigners; men who have not their wives and children here with them, and as a result, send the bulk of their money out of town to their families. Under present conditions this cannot very well be avoided, as the wheels of industry are to be kept in motion. There is no one else to do the work. Most of our own men are wearing the khaki. But what about our own people who are the ones who should be interested in building up the town in which they are making their living? Are they doing their share to help build up the town by dealing at home or are they helping to build up some other town or city by sending their money away? We fear the number of money orders and express orders sent out of here daily answers the question.

There is nothing to it. We cannot expect conditions to improve so long as we do not properly use the means which tend to that improvement. We might write columns in support of the principal of dealing at home but the following story covers the ground very nicely.

A man had a five-dollar bill which he marked. On Saturday night he took it to the local merchant and spent it. The following Wednesday he got the same bill back again for some work he had done. Thursday he spent it again in the same store and Saturday he got it back again. On Monday he sent it to a mail order house and he has never seen that bill since. That was seven years ago.

That five-dollar bill instead of doing its little bit to build up its home town is now performing a similar mission in some far away field.

CHILD'S PLAY.

The action of the Medicine Hat hotel men in signing a compact to close their hotels because they could not get concessions from the city, looks to us from this distance like a piece of child's play. We do not think for a moment that a hotel which is losing money every day should be kept open simply to accommodate the travelling public, but because one or two or three are losing money is no reason why they should all close down and leave the city in such a miserable condition.

There is no doubt that even hotels in a place the size of Medicine Hat could be made to pay and the ones in a position to give it a fair trial should have stayed in the game.

Although they are putting the travelling public to considerable

inconvenience and giving the town a black eye, the hotelmen will find that conditions will soon right themselves and they will never be missed. As soon as there is a demand for any line of business the supply is there in long coming to the rescue. Already the situation is partially solved, for now, travelling men are coming to Redcliff to spend the night and are motorizing into the Hat for business.

A GOOD SELECTION.

Although nomination day passed off very quietly last Monday good selections were made to fill the vacancies on both the council and the school board.

For the council Mr. Howard's experience as an accountant should prove quite an assistance in helping keep the town's affairs in good shape, as he is already conversant with them and with the town's standing in all branches. Mr. McLean is also interested in the town to a considerable extent and is one of its biggest ratepayers. Because of this it will be to his interests as well as in the interests of the town at large to see that its affairs are conducted as economically as possible. Besides his ability and experience well fits him for the position.

The selection of Dr. Brown for the school board is also a very satisfactory one. As well as being interested in education, his professional training should be an assistance to the board in looking after the health and comforts of our children.

Most important of all the newly elected members are men of good judgment whom we are satisfied will work harmoniously together for the general welfare of the town.

LOOKS TO THE SCHOOL.

The Conservation Bulletin, a paper issued by the Conservation Commission of Canada, has an article in its last issue dealing with the very apparent lack of accurate bookkeeping on the average farmer. The article points out that no account is kept of the expenses in connection with the different articles produced or the revenue derived from the different sources. Because of this a few farmers do not know in what lines they are making money and in what they are losing. This, it claims, is very unbusinesslike and in some cases may result in wasted energy.

The paper looks to the children and our schools as a means of remedying this state of affairs. It suggests correlating school subjects with practical life on the farm. Along this line the article says: "In rural and village schools, particularly, the interest of children in their school work should be aroused and held by its intimate contact with agriculture. A few suggestions are offered herewith for impressing upon the pupils the utility value of the subjects taught."

In connection with the teaching of arithmetic the following topics might be used as a basis for problems and general instruction:

Neat methods of compiling farm records, e.g., milk and egg production, receipts and expenses, time sheets, etc., these records will form the basis for numerous problems.

"Cost of production, rent, labor, wear and tear of machinery, marketing of farm products, computation of profits; measurement of fields, woodlands; lumber, ice-houses, etc.; invoices, cheques, receipts and commercial forms; taxation; mortgages."

The teaching of reading and the study of literature offer exceptional opportunities for arousing the interest of the pupil.

The best literature is replete with selections calculated to in-

spire a love of outdoor life and an interest in the plants and animals with which the country child comes in daily contact. Whittier's "The Barefoot Boy," Burns' "To a Mountain Daisy," and Lowell's description of a day in June, are examples, and every teacher will be able to pick out scores of other pieces of merit."

The rapid growth and healthy condition of the trees put out last spring on Fifth street in the town, should be an inducement to all property owners in town to plant a few trees around their property. Almost every tree on that street is alive and growing wonderfully and even now they make a vast improvement in the appearance of the street.

Canada's Contribution to Carelessness

In war time, and while many industries are urging thrift and economy the Canadian people are burning up their created resources at a much greater rate this year than last.

During the first five months of 1916, the fire loss in Canada has exceeded that of January, May, 1915, by approximately \$1,000,000, or \$600,000 per month. At this rate of increase our fire loss will exceed that of 1915 by \$7,500,000.

Canada has need of all her financial resources. She is borrowing money to carry on the war, and is paying per cent interest thereon. The additional fire loss of 1916 would therefore pay the interest charge on the recent war loan of \$100,000,000 and would pay \$2,500,000 of the principal. Canada's average annual fire loss of over \$25,000,000, would pay per cent interest on approximately half a billion dollars. Our fire loss is, however, something for which we are receiving no value, either financial or patriotic; it is simply a tax, due in our opinion, to carelessness. The Canadians appear willing to pay, and which they, as a whole, are doing little to avert.

German Crops Short and Labor Scarce

From a reliable source it is learned that the Prussian agricultural minister's optimistic view of the harvest is not in the least shared by the great majority of agricultural authorities, who admit that the official statements are highly exaggerated and confused.

Great difficulty will be found in procuring the meagre and damaged crops, owing to the lack of expert male labor, female labor being less plentiful than usual owing to the rain and damaged state of the crops. There is an immense loss to the potatoes, which are lying in swamped ground, rotting. If there is no spot of warm weather immediately, the harvest will be much below last year's. Then nothing can be done. This is the expression used freely.

Canadian Woods Only "In order to encourage the use of Canadian hardwoods for interior decoration, Lord Stansbury has issued instructions to use nothing but Canadian forest products in the sleeping, parlor, dining and observation cars in the office and hotel buildings of the Canadian Pacific Railway."

Lord Stansbury has had samples of all Canadian hardwoods tested at the Angus Sheds in Montreal, where selected specimens were tested with polishes, stains, etc., and the results showed that Canadian woods compare very favorably with imported varieties.

Well Made Bread

The bread-maker may consider her bread well made if it has the following features: Lightness, both in weight and in appearance; the interior; the shape, evenly raised throughout; a "nutty" flavor, the crust, evenly browned; and, most of all, the softness of sugar, a pleasant odor; the crumb of an even and even grain, crumbly, white in color, tender and elastic enough to spring back under the pressure of the finger; the crust crisp, but not hard, and evenly browned on top, bottom and sides.

Now French Patent Food For fattening poultry in France the epitome in the favorable plan. It is a mixture of eggs, with a separate compartment for each bird, generally 30 inches square, and open at the top. No place is allowed for improvement. Some of the epitomes can accommodate fifty to one hundred birds. The bottom of the cage is in open work, and below a movable board strewn with ashes or sawdust to receive the droppings. It is a trough for food and an earthen vessel for water. The chicks, after fattening, are kept warm, and the light gradually dimmed until the birds are secured on the fifth day. Only when the birds are fat and the light is even more than fifty to one hundred lamp.

Canada Gets More Munition Orders

The announcement last week that the Imperial munition board had received from the British government further orders for \$35,000,000 worth of heavy shells for delivery early in 1917, brings the total of orders in Canada for shells and high explosives up to more than half a billion dollars. The new order includes mainly six-inch and nine-inch-inch shells.

So far Canada has delivered a little more than \$200,000,000 worth of shells. At the present time deliveries are averaging nearly \$10,000,000 worth a day. By the end of the year the output will be at least \$35,000,000 worth a month. About \$500,000,000 worth of orders are now in process of being filled by some 4,000 Canadian firms. The new five making plant established near Montreal is now in satisfactory operation and Canada can now produce for Great Britain more than a score of thousand of shells every day, all ready for the artillery at the front to fire.

Greek Settlers Bring \$50,000 to Canada

The latest group of settlers for Alberta to arrive from the United States is a party of 20 Greeks from Manon City, Idaho. They have just gone west on the Canadian Northern. They are going to settle at Marlborough, Alta., where they already have friends. They are bringing into Canada some \$50,000 in cash, besides their personal effects.

United States Buys

Danish West Indies
Official announcement was made at the White House Tuesday that negotiations have practically been completed for the purchase of the Danish West Indies by the United States from Denmark for \$25,000,000. The treaty closing the transaction probably will be signed and sent to the senate this week.

ADDRESSING MAIL TO OUR SOLDIERS.

In order to facilitate the handling of mail at the front and to insure prompt delivery it is requested that all mail be addressed as follows:

- (a) Regimental Number.
- (b) Rank.
- (c) Name.
- (d) Squadron, Battery or Company.
- (e) Battalion, Regiment, (or other unit) Staff appointment or Department.
- (f) Canadian Contingent.
- (g) British Expeditionary Force.
- (h) Army Post Office, London, England.

Unnecessary mention of higher formations, such as brigades, divisions, is strictly forbidden and causes delay.

THIS LOOKS GOOD.

In new contracts made by the British government departments for material concerned with the war there appears a clause providing that such contracts may be cancelled at any date after September next.

Among the matters to be dealt with by Sir Sam Hughes on his arrival in London is a scheme for the formation of a Canadian flying corps, which is already drawn up with the necessary preparations for launching it as soon as the project is approved.
