TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin, Oct. 3rd.—The village of Losheim near Malmedy, amid great popular rejoicing was restored to Germany yesterday by the frontier commission. It declared that this action was taken because of the unanimous desire of the villagers to rejoin the fatherland.

Dublin, Oct. 3rd.—The Sinn Fein delegation to the conference in London, beginning Oct. 11th, which will explore the possibilities of the Irish situation with a view to a definite settlement, will leave Dublin next Monday. It was announced here today. Mr. De Valera will not be one of the Sinn Fein delegates and will not go to London in connection with the conference according to Desmond Fitzgerald to the Sinn Fein Minister of propaganda who made the announcement regarding the delegations departure.

Budapest, Oct. 3rd.—A resolution was passed by the Cabinet council yesterday to comply with the ultimatum of the council of Ambassadors issued in Paris on Sept. 23rd, "instructing Hungary to evacuate Burgenland," the council expressed apprehension as to the extent to which it would be able to deal with the insurgents in West Hungary.

New York, Oct. 3rd.—With the major league baseball season passed into history the eyes of the sporting world are turning towards the polo grounds. There on Wednesday the Giants and the Yanks will begin their struggle for the title of world's champion. The National League champions finished the season with a defeat by their old rivals the Brooklyn Superbs yesterday, while the Yanks wound up by winning from the Boston Red Sox. Pittsburg maintained second place in the National League by a victory over the St. Louis Cardinals and the Louis Browns won third place in the American circuit by subduing the Detroit Tigers. Cleveland lost its final contest to Chicago.

New York, Oct. 3rd.—The raw sugar market was quiet for uncontrolled centrifugal sugar. Cuba's with no sales reported. Raw futures were steadier on 20s and prices at midday were about two points net higher. There appeared to be a little better inquiry for refined sugar and early prices were unchanged at 5.50 for fine granulated. Refined futures were nominal.

London, Oct. 3rd.—The Archbishop of Canterbury, as president of the world alliance for promoting international friendship throughout the churches, has addressed a letter to the president of the national councils in America, Europe and Asia, appealing to all the Christian churches to set apart Sunday November 6th, as a day of prayer for the divine blessing on the Washington conference on limitation of armaments and far eastern problems, beginning November 11th.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Oct. 3rd.—After more than fifty hours of recurrent earthquake shocks and almost continuous trembling, the seismic disturbances at Richfield, Elsinore and Monroe, 120 miles south of Salt Lake City, have subsided. Property damage at Elsinore and Monroe is estimated at more than \$100,000.

Sydney, N. S. Oct. 3rd.—Dr. A. Calder of Whitney Pier, who graduated two years ago at an upper Canadian college today received an offer of appointment as chief medical officer of the island of St. Vincent in the West Indies. The offer was sent by the Governor of St. Vincent through the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia.

Washington, Oct. 1st.—There are sixty-nine reported strikes in the United States at this time, a greater number than existed simultaneously any time since the war, Secretary of Labour Dugan said yesterday. The Secretary attributed wage reduction as the cause in most cases, remarking that the building and garment trades were the particular sources of industrial trouble.

London, Oct. 1st.—Sugar in stock on the 1st inst., was 112,000 tons. Last year 117,000 tons.

London, Oct. 4th.—Mr. Lloyd George planned to leave Gairloch today after a holiday which was often interrupted by state business. Irish problems and the unemployment situation were considered so frequently by Mr. Lloyd George, that during much of the time he spent at Gairloch he has been as busy as if he had remained in London. The Prime Minister's health is reported to have been improved by the air of the Scottish Highlands, but his physician had forbidden him to address any public meetings for some time. Mr. Lloyd George however is so impressed with the gravity and urgency of the unemployment question, that he has decided, it was reported today, to lay before the public without delay information as to the important conferences he held over the last week-end with financial, commercial and industrial experts.

London, Oct. 4th. The South Wales Coal Mine owners at a meeting yesterday at Cardiff decided to accept an invitation of the Mines Department of the Govt. to refer to an arbitration board the disputes over the terms under which the subsidy was granted, to hasten the end of the recent strike of coal miners. Under the Govts. interpretation of the terms, the mine owners are asked to pay £75,000 more in wages to the men.

London, Oct. 5th.—Under the sliding scale adopted by a board of conciliation and arbitration affecting the manufactured iron and steel trade of North England, wages will be reduced 25% immediately, making the total reductions since January 132½%. The present wage scale is 97½% above the pre-war scale. The Villiers Spelter Works at Swansea has reopened and is the only spelter works in South Wales now operating. The management announced that wage reductions enabled the plant to resume operations.
