TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New Orleans, La., Nov. 26th.—Holding the Wartime Prohibition Act unconstitutional, Federal District Judge Foster today granted an injunction restraining government officials from interfering with the sale by the Henry Leixec Company of bonded liquors held in warehouses here.

London, Nov. 26th.—The condition of Mr. Johnson, the American prohibition worker, who suffered a severe injury to the eye during the course of a "ragging" by medical students recently, is reported to be much worse. There is little hope of saving the injured eye, it was said today.

Paris, Nov. 26th.—Contrary to expectations the plenipotentiaries of Jugo-Slavia did not sign the Austrian Peace Treaty this afternoon. The reason given by them was that they found that they did not have the requisite power to sign the different annexes. The plenipotentiaries have eight days within which to procure the necessary power and it is believed that this authorization will be received in that period. The annexes provide for the protection of racial minorities, reparations concerning Italy and a financial arrangement regarding sharing of expenses and the liberation of the former Austro-Hungarian Monarchy. The time for the signing of the Bulgarian Peace Treaty has been definitely fixed for ten-thirty o'clock tomorrow. It will take place in the Neuilly Town Hall.

London, Nov. 26th.—Mr. John Lawson (Labourite) has been elected to the House of Commons in the bye-election in Chester-Le-Street, Durham County. Mr. Lawson polled 17,838 votes as against 5,313 cast for his national Democratic opponent Mr. David Gilmour. The election was held on November 11th.

Washington, Nov. 26th.—The national coal situation has reached a crisis in the view of officials here, and drastic steps to curtail consumption are in contemplation. It was said that among other steps, an order prohibiting the manufacture of coke has been prepared.

San Francisco, Nov. 26th.—Mr. Herbert E. Easton of London, England, Secretary of the British Empire and Settlement League, died suddenly yesterday of heart failure, immediately after concluding an address before the California Development Board, on British plans for aiding former soldiers to become farmers.

Paris, Nov. 26th.—Ball-rooms and dancing schools have been closed by a

Government order because of the coal crisis.

London, November 26th.—Considerable improvement in the Adriatic situation is reported here as a result of conversations in Paris between British, French, Italian and Jugo-Slav representatives. The latest indications are that there is a possibility of a compromise settlement satisfactory to all parties, including Captain D'Annunzio.

Rome, Nov. 26th.—Premier Nitti held a long conference yesterday with M. Camille Barriere, the French Ambassador, according to an announcement made by the "Epoca".

London, Nov. 26th.—A wireless message from Berlin gives the text of a stern note from M. Clemenceau, President of the Peace Conference, to the Chairman of the German delegation to Versailles, referring to deviate from the terms of the Peace Treaty in favour of German prisoners, who are employed in the work of reconstruction in devastated northern France. Referring to the brutal treatment meted out to the populations of this district under German occupation, M. Clemenceau is quoted as saying: "The deepest sentiments of the human heart have been so cruelly injured that French public opinion cannot agree to grant the favour you request. The Note sets forth that Germany systematically delayed the performance of the armistice terms, and instances the sinking of the German warships in Scapa Flow, the delay in the delivery of German ships, Germany's Baltic policy and the Anti-Entente propaganda in Alsace and the world at large and declares "we owe nothing to Germany except the precise fulfilment of the provisions of the Peace Treaty accepted by Germany."

London, Nov. 26th.—General Denekine's army in Southern Russia is retreating, the Bolsheviki having captured ten towns in three days and are still advancing, according to a wireless despatch received here from Moscow. Bolsheviki troops are entering Ukraine where they intend to stay, the despatch adds. Admiral Kolchak's forces in Central Siberia are retiring rapidly, according to the despatch, and the Reds have reached a point 87 miles east of Omsk.

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 26th.—General Feline Angeles, Mexican revolutionary leader, and famed throughout the world as a military genius, was executed by a Carranza firing squad at Chihuahua City early today, following the conviction with two companions on charges of rebellion against the Mexican Govt., according to a telegraphic report from Chihuahua City this morning.

London, Nov. 26th.—The Govt. will introduce a Bill in the House of Commons this week providing for the suspension of the trial by jury in Ireland in special criminal cases and leaving the determination of such cases to special commissions consisting of three judges of the
