## TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, June 9th.—During a discussion in the Chamber of Deputies on the Merchant Marine Budget, M. Bignon, the Secretary, stated that the French merchant fleet, which before the war had a total tonnage of 2,650,000 would soon reach 3,550,000 tons, thanks to various gains, and notwithstanding the losses sustained during the war.

Paris, June 9th.—M. Millerand in the course of a hearing before the Foreign Affairs Committee of the Chamber regarding eastern affairs, stated with regard to Mosul that, upon his assumption of office, he found himself in the presence of engagements made by the previous cabinet, which he had to comply with. With regard to Syria, he defined the policy of the Government which, he said, could only be one of limited action.

Warsaw, June 9th.—The resignation of the cabinet is announced.

Berlin, June 10th.—An official note states that the reduction of the German army to a strength of two hundred thousand men has been completed, in accordance with the treaty of Versailles.
