OFFICIAL NEWS.

Government, Secretary Timmons was suddenly taken ill with appendicitis Saturday night and promptly removed to the Naval Hospital, St. Thomas, where he was operated on Sunday. The operation was successful.

Governor, Oman has detailed First Lieutenant Leo F. S. Horan, U. S. M. C., as Acting Government Secretary and to duty with the Harbor Board and food Commission until Government Secretary Timmons returns from the hospital.

Lieutenant, Robert O'Hagan, Supply Corps, U. S. N. recently on duty as Despatching Secretary, St. Croix, had been detached and left via the Virginia on Monday for San Juan to report for duty in Porto Rico.

TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, March 17th.—Current and pending capital issued include one million pounds capital for home grown sugar, of which two hundred and fifty thousand pounds will be publicly offered. The Govt. will take additional shares equivalent to the number already subscribed. The Govt. guarantees five per cent interest until 1930, to encourage the beet sugar industry.

London, March 17th.—Introducing the naval estimates in the House of Commons today, Mr. Walter Long said that the Govt. was firmly adhering to the traditional policy that the navy should not be inferior to the navies of other powers. Then alluding to the United States as the only country whose navy approached that of Great Britain in strength, he said that the idea of competition in armaments between the United States and Great Britain was repugnant, adding, "We hope and believe that if there is any emulation between us, it is likely to be in reaching a decision for reducing that ample amount of naval strength which we alike possess over other naval powers. This is he declared the foundation of the British naval policy.

Hague, March 17th.—A Royal decree issued yesterday says that the place to be allotted to former Emperor William of Germany, as his residence, will form a part of the province of Utrecht, and that it will be fixed later by the Government. The decree was in connection with an announcement to the Allied Premiers regarding their recent note concerning the one time monarch.

Constantinople, March 17th.—Constantinople has been occupied by the Allied forces under General Sir George Milner. This long looked for military demonstration by the allies against Turkey was carried out with only one untoward happening, namely a serious clash at the War Office, where the Turks resisted the Allied troops. An exchange of shots resulted, in which several Punjabees of the East Indian forces and a few of the Turks were killed. The excitement caused by the occupation quieted down before darkness, which brought absolute calm. The landing of the forces of occupation was carried out under the guns of a formidable allied fleet anchored in the Bosphorus. The Super Dreadnought "Benbow" was moored at Galata Quay with her guns trained upon Stamboul. Another man of war faced the arsenal in the Golden Horn while all the other warships in the Bosphorus were standing by with their decks cleared for action. Except in the instance stated, however, there was no resistance to the allied forces as they carried out their orders for the occupation of the historic capital. The population in fact showed little alarm nor was there any sign of panic, except in one section of Stamboul, as the commanders of the allied troops brought their forces ashore. These forces included four thousand blue-jackets and marines from British warships and contingents from the forces of all the allies represented here. The Indian detachments have Moslems on their resters among the troops taking part in the operations.

London, March 23rd.—Sugar in stock on the 20th. inst. was 47,000 tons. Last year 162,000 tons.

Berlin, March 17th.—After holding the reins of power for less than five days, Dr. Knapp has retired from office and control. He resigned today an official communication explaining that he considered his mission fulfilled when the old Government decided to get the most essential demands addressed to it. He was also moved to this action by the extreme necessity of the Fatherland, which demanded union against the dangers of Bolshevism.

London March 18th.—Dr. Knapp, head of the reactionary Government set up in Berlin last Saturday and whose resignation was reported yesterday, has committed suicide, according to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Amsterdam, quoting a telephone message from Berlin.

Capetown, March 18th.—The Cape Times says that General Smuts, with the Unionists, will have a majority of four in the Chamber and that it is considered probable that the labour party will support his economic and financial measures.
