TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Copenhagen, Oct. 1st.—Bolshevik gold poured into the coal mining districts of England and Wales to bring about the threatened coal strike was a fact disclosed in documents left behind when M. Litvinoff was forced to leave Denmark for Norway. The authorities are investigating the records also show a number of extremist papers in various countries and trades unions were receiving Bolshevik gold subsidies monthly. Two Copenhagen unions received 50,000 kroner annually.

Ottawa, Oct. 1st.—Canada's navy consisting of the cruiser Aurora and the destroyers Patriot and Patrician will be commissioned on November 1st and will leave England for Canada shortly after that date. It was explained at the Department of Naval Service that the commissioning of the vessels means that they are placed in the class of active warships.

London, Oct. 1st.—The general belief prevails tonight that a strike of the coal miners will be avoided as a result of a decision taken today to call for a re-ballot of the miners on the question of ceasing work. A re-ballot is expected to result in an acceptance by the men of an offer by the owners of an advance in wages of two shillings per shift when the output of coal reaches 248,000,000 tons yearly. This was the rate of the output of the first three months of the year.

Belfast, Oct. 1st.—According to the Glasgow correspondent of the Irish News, a Nationalist organ, the Government is considering the advisability of withdrawing all garrisons and troops from the inner regions of Southern Ireland and to the sea coast towns and establishing a boycott of the south if "reprisals on the existing method and a more extensive scale prove abortive."

London, Oct. 2nd.—A proposal to revise the treaty of Versailles to stabilize the world's economic conditions will be one of the principal topics for discussion at the International Economic Conference in London on Oct. 11th, 12th and 13th.

Copenhagen, Oct. 2nd.—Reports that a strike movement is rapidly spreading in Russia resulting in serious disturbances in various parts of the country have been received from Helsingfors. The correspondent declared that travellers from Russia confirm the recent reports that street conflicts had occurred in Petrograd where several Soviet commissioners were killed by the mob. Persistent rumours that Leon Trotsky had been wounded and that General Budenny, the noted cavalry leader, was being court martialled also were in circulation, the report says. At a mass meeting which was largely attended by Petrograd people a resolution is said to have been unanimously passed in favour of an immedi-

ate peace with the rest of the world.

London, Oct. 2nd. An interesting rumour that the Prince of Wales had become engaged during his tour in Canada is current in political clubs and Canadian circles. The story originated with a woman member of the Royal Household who said the identity of the girl was being kept secret pending the Prince's return to England. Perhaps Canada can supply information was the answer given by one interviewer.

New York, Oct. 2nd.—Furness Withy and Co. have acquired through purchase the Trinidad Line of steamers with certain properties of the Trinidad Shipping and Trading Company located in the West Indies. While the price paid will range in the millions the figure at which the deal was consummated was not revealed. It is stated that the Trinidad Line will be closely affiliated with the Quebec Steamship Company, which line covers the principal islands of the Windward and Leeward group going as far south as Demerara.

London, Oct. 2nd.—The Miners' Conference has decided to ask the miners as a whole to vote on the question whether the wage dispute shall be submitted to an impartial tribunal.

Antigua, Aug. 10th.—Mr. L. S. Cranstoun, proprietor and member of the Legislative Council, died here at noon today.

Demerara, Oct. 5th.—It is announced that Major C. H. King, Acting Inspector General of Police and Commandant of the local forces, has been ordered and accepted the position of Commissioner of Police, Sierra Leone.

Cork, Oct. 10th.—It is announced that Lord Mayor MacSweeney continues clear and vigorous in mind, although he is in a state of extreme weakness.

Havana, Oct. 10th.—The International Bank of Cuba has suspended payment and closed its operations, creating by this action a general panic among the depositors of all the banks of the republic. On Saturday the Spanish and National Banks paid more than ten million dollars to their clients who withdrew their deposits. The President of the Republic has declared that he will take measures to assist the banking houses in order that they may not succumb on account of this groundless alarm. The Stock Exchange of Havana will be closed as long as an actual crisis exists. The directorate of the Exchange is sitting permanently, for the purpose of studying the financial situation.

Riga, Oct. 10th.—The delegates to the Peace Conference contemplate signing the treaty on Monday. The Polish demand for three hundred millions of roubles appears to have been met by the payment of eighty millions.

Havana, Oct. 11th.—Under the terms of the presidential moratorium which has been issued, drafts, bills of exchange and promissory notes will not be effective until the first of December. Between
