Harvard Stadium, July 23rd.—The Athletes of Harvard and Yale, combining their forces against those of the British universities of Oxford and Cambridge, won the fifth of the meetings of their International series here today. The meeting was marked by a new world's record of 25 feet 2 inches by Edward Gouredon of Jacksonville Fla. Harvard's Negro Athlete, in the running broad jump. Gouredon's leap to the edge of the pit was the longest of which there is any record, professional or amateur. The best previous performance known was 24 feet 11½ inches, made by Peter O'Connor in Ireland some years ago. Some of the principal events were one mile run, won by H. B. Stallard, Cambridge, second N. G. Thatham, Cambridge, time 4 mins 20 3/5 secs. (A new record). Capt. O'Connell of Harvard was forced to retire after an accident. Running high jump. Won by R. W. Landon, Yale, height 6 feet 3 inches (a new record), second C. G. Krogness, Harvard 6 feet. The 440 yards run was won by B. G. D. Rudd Oxford. Time 49 seconds, (a new record). Sixteen pound throw. Won by J. F. Brown, Harvard, distance 159 feet ¾ inches (a new record).

Riga, July 23rd.—Soviet Russia's note of protest against the failure to extend her an invitation to the Washington conference on far Eastern questions handed to the United States Charge D'Affaires at Stockholm, declares that the Moscow Govt. will not recognize decisions reached at the conference at which it is not represented. The Soviet note was sent not only to the United States, but also to Great Britain, France, China and Japan. It hails with much joy a discussion on disarmament, but expresses scepticism that any guarantees regarding such disarmament can be possible. The absence of the Russian Govt. from discussion on the subject would only have the result to make Russia to ignore any decision reached, the note declares.
