LOCAL.

The proprietor of the Christiansted Theatre asks to express his sincere apologies for any disappointment experienced by patrons of the show of last night for which there had been advertised but not presented the conclusion of the "Carter Case", owing to the reels not having arrived from St. Thomas from where they were dispatched by the mail-schooner yesterday.

The theatre was crowded last night when the 14th. episode of the famous "Carter Case" and two episodes of the "Secret of the Submarine" comprised a very attractive programme. It is expected to exhibit the last parts of the "Carter Case" on Monday night next.

The Vigilant which, according to cable advice, sailed from St. Thomas at 11 a.m. yesterday is not to be seen on the hori-

zon. There is little breeze at present and it is unlikely that she will be here today. An unusual calm has prevailed during the last few days.

A partial paralysis in the fish industry is reported from Water Gut where it was mentioned some time ago that the sale had been prohibited, all the fishermen from that quarter being required to use the fish-house near the fort. The men hold that it is a great inconvenience to them to trade fish so far away from their homes where they have special facilities, and to this end a petition was forwarded to Government for permission to continue to offer their fish in the old place or for the erection of a fish-house in that quarter. For the latter purpose it is understood that Mr. John Richard Leevy has very kindly placed a plot of land in Water Gut at disposal. It is emphasized that not alone is the fish-house near the fort too small and therefore too much congested by all the boats landing there but the patronage from the Water Gut quarter is practically cut off since the diversion of the boats to this end.

OFFICIAL NEWS.

Governor Oman has been informed that the returns of the presidential election in the United States on November 2nd. will be broadcasted to the Naval Service by radio from Arlington, Va. Wireless reports will be received in St. Thomas hourly until midnight on November 2nd and at noon and 10 p. m. on November 3rd. and will be furnished to the press of the Virgin Islands immediately upon receipt.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Oct. 14th.—Gabriel D'Annunzio, Commander of Fiume, is quoted by the correspondent of the Times at that place as saying, with respect to the Adriatic situation: "I shall immediately occupy any territory held now by the Italian Army and Navy should the Govt. consent to evacuate it. I have ample forces at my disposal to do this and it is known positively that the Italian forces occupying the territory of Istria and Dalmatia will refuse to obey the Govt. and will accept my leadership. In any case I will act within six hours after the news reaches me of the Govt's. forfeitures. In that event I am certain that if the Jugo-Slavs attack us, all Italy will rise as one man and defend Adriatic supremacy and force the Govt. to support me". D'Annunzio is reported by the correspondent to have 6,000 fine troops, thirty airplanes, one dreadnought, two cruisers, five destroyers and ten small destroyers.

London, Oct. 14th.—The high cost of living in England is, at an end. "The

war boom is over", according to the London newspapers which announced the fact with prominently displayed streamers across their front pages. They indicate the English are optimistic of giving the knockout blow very soon to the remaining high prices. During the last six months the average fall in prices on war materials has been 30 percent. Rubber products have come down 50 percent, tin has tumbled 25, copper 6, merino wool 45 and America cotton 30 percent. The only sensational decline among staple foods however, was the 30 percent drop in the price of sugar.

London, Oct. 15th.—Investigations by Scotland Yard officials of forged Bank of England pound notes incline the experts to believe that they are part of a Bolshevik plot to destroy the confidence of nations in the money of the world. They link the British forgeries up with the recently discovered forgeries of American twenty dollar notes and German and Scandinavian paper money. Proof has been secured that the Bolshevik printing office at Petrograd is equipped to issue millions of spurious British notes soon. The right grade and texture of paper has been secured and plates have been engraved. Tests of notes show they cannot be detected from real money except by the careful inspection of experts. It is reported from the same sources that furnished the evidence in this matter, that the Reds printing house could flood the world with forged money of all nations. Evidence is piling up which corroborates the reports sent out from Petrograd months ago that the Soviets had determined to take from all nations confidence in their money, throwing up the people back on a straight gold basis. As there would not be gold to meet the commercial requirements of business, this course would effectually block the wheels of industry. They see in this campaign of counterfeits the final blow against the Allied nations, for they believe that when working men have lost confidence in the credit money of nations and refuse to work except for gold, all industry will be wrecked and the way paved for a world wide Soviet.

London, Oct 14th.—A War Office report says:—"A review of the whole situation in Mesopotamia gives hope that our worst troubles are over.

Halle, Germany, Oct. 15th.—For fully four hours last night M. Zinovieff, chairman of the executive committee of the International and one of the four big chiefs of Soviet Russia, pleaded with the Independent Socialists at their convention here to join in with Moscow to create a revolution in Germany and help carry out the proletarian programme for a world revolution. At the conclusion of the Russian's address the Radicals of the party and the audience in the packed galleries stood with bared heads singing the international while the conservatives
