TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

London, Nov. 14th—The troublesome question of how a meeting of the Allies be arranged before the Lausanne peace conference for the purpose of outlining the Allied programme as Great Britain has insisted, has been settled, as a result of an exchange of messages by the Chancellories at Paris, Rome and London. Neither M. Poincare nor Premier Mussolini can leave his Capital for a conference elsewhere, before proceeding to Lausanne, it has developed, but Lord Curzon has arranged to see M. Poincare in Paris on the way to Lausanne probably on Thursday and the conversation will be continued by the two on the train from Paris to Lausanne. Premier Mussolini has arranged to leave Rome for Lausanne on Friday and join his colleagues for a preliminary meeting at Lausanne on Sunday. Reports from Geneva that the Turks would refuse to enter the Lausanne conference, if the Allies made any preliminary agreements, evoked the statement in official circles here that little importance was attached to this. It was pointed out that it was customary for the Allies to have preliminary conferences under similar circumstances and that there was no logical ground upon which the Turks could protest against such a meeting. The opinion is expressed in official circles that in view of the easing of the tension, the Allied representatives at Constantinople have decided it is unnecessary for the present to proclaim a state of seige. A News Agency despatch from Constantinople dated Monday, said the Allies had handed Rodosto over to the Nationalists and that the official handing over of Adrianople would occur on November 19th.

Washington, Nov. 14th.—Ambassador Child, at Rome, and Minister Crew, at Berne, will be the American observers at the Near Eastern Conference at Lausanne. Rear Admiral Bristol, High Commissioner at Constantinople, will be named the Associate Commissioner.

London, Nov. 14th.—While the political managers decline flatly to make any official predictions as to the result of tomorrow's elections, the Star, succeeded today in getting unofficial estimates from the various headquarters of what the managers expect. According to the Star the Independent Liberals claim for themselves 145 seats in Parliament, the Labourites claim 160, the National Liberals claim 75 and the Conservatives 365, including Nationalists of all sorts. These figures total 745, so it is apparent that somebody is going to be disappointed as there are only 615 seats to be filled.

Berlin, Nov. 14th.—The Cabinet of Chancellor Wirth resigned tonight after the United Socialists had voted not to participate in a Coalition Ministry, which includes members of the German peoples party.

London Nov. 14th.—The radio broad-
