The Department of Education
5th Appointed Member (Mc marked: Mr Chairman. Going through the amendments of the Municipal Committee I find that this department has had a big slash. Why it is done, I do not know. To my mind the Education Department is one of the most important Departments on the island. It is taking care of our children and giving them an education. I would like to know why it was given such a slash?

2nd Member for Christiansted Town [Canegata]: It was given the same amount as last year.

5th Appointed Member (Mc Intosh) continuing: The schools are short of teachers and it is proposed to augment the staffs of the schools. We had a private school and that was closed as a result of Government refusing to grant it a subsidy, and the children had to attend the Public Schools, thereby increasing the number on the rolls of those schools and consequently the work of the teaching staffs. This, the Municipal Committee had not taken into consideration at the time they made the amendment, or, I am sure, they would not have done so. I was given to understand that there are fifty to sixty pupils under one teacher. I sent to the Assistant Director to inquire the reason of this and he told me that he had not sufficient money to employ more teachers, but he was hoping that the Council would, in the new fiscal year, allow more money to get the teachers needed. We look to the Education Department for the education of our children, and it is clear that this department must have the money to carry on the work. I move therefore that the amounts as originally budgetted by the Educational Department be voted for, and in view of the fact that it is one of the most important of the Departments that this Council shall give this matter its favorable consideration.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town [Canegata]: Mr. Vice-Chairman. I have no intention whatever to discuss the merits of the Honorable 5th Appointed Member's speech. I have as good a knowledge of education as he. As I told you we budgetted just what was spent by that department last year. If this amount is not sufficient for the proper working of the department the Director of Education may come to the Council with an additional money bill and I am sure that the Council (including the Honorable 5th Appointed Member) will vote for it.

As regards Maintenance, if the Honorable Member will look at the budget he will see that this department has not received a single cent less than last year. We have no desire to see the standard of education of this island below that of any other, — because we all know that nothing is more important to the life and progress of a country than brains.
