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board the French Cruiser "Julesmiclelet." The town was decorated with bunting and a triumphal arch was erected on the Cours Nolvos. His Excellency the Governor and suite proceeded on board the warship shortly after her arrival and accompanied the General ashore, where he was met by Town Council, heads of Government the Departments and Societies. A guard of honour was formed by the local troops and gendarmes after the salute, General Mangin proceeded to Govt. House where he was entertained by His Excellency the Governor at a banquet and ball. To-day the general will inspect the forts and local troops in the morning and at ten a. m. he will attend a reception at the Town Hall. The general leaves for Pointeapitre tomorrow.

London, June 28th.—The coal miners strike, which has been in progress since April 1st, has been settled, it was officially announced this afternoon. It is understood that Mr. Lloyd George will ask parliament this afternoon to authorize the granting of a ten million pounds substitute to the mining industry the miners will resume work generally next Monday, if the subsidy is granted. The Govt. offered this subsidy several weeks ago, but withdrew it after the recent proposition by the owners for a settlement had been voted down by the miners. The general understanding is that the submission of the subsidy proposition to Parliament is a mere formality and that the grant will be voted.

London, June 28th.—The Government before assenting to the demand that the £10,000,000 subsidy be made available, want assurances regarding the allocation of the grant, the scale of district wages reductions and guarantees that peace will be maintained. The provisional agreement which is conditional upon the Govts. offer of ten million pounds being renewed, provides that the minimum wage for a seven hour day shall not be less than 20% above the previous standard for an eight hour day, with a division of income between wages and profits. During the dispute 1,120,000 tons of coal have been imported into England mostly from France and Belgium, though America contributed 325,000 tons. In several other industries including the engineering trade wage disputes continue and ballots are being taken by a large number of men on proposals to accept wage reduction. There is little doubt that the votes will be against accepting the proposed reductions, but it is probable that negotiations will be resumed.

Belfast June 28th.—Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier, announced today that the Ulster Cabinet accepted the invitation of Mr. Lloyd George for the proposed conference between representatives of Northern and Southern Ireland, and the British Prime Minister.
