PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that on and after July 1, 1920, all persons who wish to become teachers or become eligible for teachers' positions in the Public Schools, will be divided into four classes, viz:

- (a) Assistant Graded Teachers
- (b) Graded Teachers
- (c) Principal Teachers
- (d) Special Teachers.

In order to effect this classification, written examinations will be held on Monday, March 28, Tuesday, March 30, and Wednesday March 31, 1920.

Any citizen of the United States, or of the Virgin Islands, over sixteen years of age, who is known to be a person of good moral character, and of sound physical health, is eligible to sit at these examinations, provided permission is obtained from the School Director not later than March 20, 1920.

Applicants may receive full information regarding the nature of the examinations by applying at the office of the School Director, where textbooks and other literature will be furnished free of charge, for the purpose of assisting applicants in preparing themselves for examinations.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Fiume, Dec. 29th.—Armed resistance to the last morsel of bread and the last drop of blood, is Gabriel D'Annunzio's latest decision in demanding further guarantees from the Italian Government to insure the annexation of Fiume to Italy.

Montreal, Dec. 29th.—As a result of the heavy advance in the price of wheat and flour by the Canadian Wheat Board, the price of bread will go up almost immediately two to three cents a loaf.

Chicago, Dec. 29th.—A shortage of one million cattle in the year just closing will cause high prices of beef and beef products for at least seven more years, it was declared by Mr. Harine, Statistician for the Union Stock Yards, in his annual report today.

Armentieres, Dec. 22th.—The recovery of the white goods industry in France from the blows dealt by the war, have been retarded by the shortage of influx due to the isolation of Russia, the great sources of supply. Notwithstanding the lack of raw materials, however, the industry, which, before the war, was centered in 32 miles here and employed more than 30,000 persons in the district around Lille, is steadily growing in rebuilt factories.

Washington, Dec. 29th.—The exportation of bituminous coal, shut off during the recent strike, will be permitted under restrictions, through an order issued by direction of General Hines. Instructions have been issued for the export throughout Newport News and Baltimore of fifty per cent of the amount handled during October, and similar arrangements will be made soon for other ports.

Paris, Dec. 29th. Louis Klotz, Minister of Finance, presented to the Chamber today the Loan Bill providing for five per cent bonds redeemable during sixty years, with drawings every six months to designate those bonds redeemable in each period. The measure is approved by the Cabinet.

Oxford, England, Dec. 29th.—Sir William Osler, the noted physician, died here this evening.

Paris, Dec. 30th.—Political circles believe that the name of Premier Clemenceau will be the only one submitted to Parliament, when the election for the President of the Republic takes place, according to the "Echo de Paris."

Montreal, Dec. 30th.—The "Prinz Frederick Wilhelm," one of the seven German liners handed over to the British Government by the United States, will be transferred to the Canadian Pacific Ocean Service, according to an announcement made here yesterday.

London, Dec. 29th.—A new schedule of railway rates fixed by the Ministry of Transport will become operative on January 15th. They will vary from twenty-five to one hundred per cent, with many
