LOCAL.

The S. S. Guiana for New York is due at Frederiksted on Thursday morning at 6 o'clock to load sugar.

It is advised that strangers having been seeking news of the weather at the post office where, as is the practice in the continental United States, Weather Bureau reports are posted supplementary to the plan by which there shall be displayed on all cars and other conveyances used for transporting United States mail suitable flags or other signals to indicate weather forecasts, cold wave warnings, frost warnings, and so forth, to be furnished by the Chief of the Weather

Bureau, the postmaster has requested and the local observer, Mr. I. Behagen, consented to furnish the post office here with notices of weather changes of interest to the public, which notices will be posted in a conspicuous place as soon as received.

Rough sea for which Frederiksted is well known has been surging since Saturday with the result that the Mystery and the S.S. Tupper could not call there to land mail and cargo. It was reported up to late yesterday that the water in the roadstead had not abated, and the Tupper was expected here today, but no accurate information as to this is forthcoming. Christiansted harbor has been as calm as a pond all along. Why not come here?

ST. CROIX STATION.

Barbados, Sept. 9th—Yesterday morning opened with rain accompanied by strong winds which gradually increased until about 10 a. m. when it blew with greater force. Trees in many places lost some of their branches and in others they were wholly upturned. The waves broke at ten fathoms of water in Carlisle Bay. S. S. Guiana and Canadian Beaver put out to sea on account of the unsafe conditions of the harbour. Considerable damage is reported to have been done inland, by the high winds but particulars are not yet to hand. One telegraph pole was blown down about four miles from town.

Barbados, Sept. 9th—Bar. 29.97 wind S. E. sea still rough. Guiana and Canadian Beaver not yet returned to port, weather clear

St. Vincent, Sept. 9th.—From about 4. 30 p. m. yesterday it started to blow a gale from N. E. which continued until about 11 p. m. with very rough sea. Trees were uprooted. Serious damage to telegraph and telephone lines. No telephone communication with out districts. It is found that much damage done to crops and property. Wind has abated. Sea still rough. Cable hut at Prospect partly destroyed.

Grenada, Sept. 9th.—The storm reached Grenada at 5 p. m. yesterday and reached its highest intensity at midnight. Telegraph and telephone lines are down. Some damage has been done to house property in town and country and roads destroyed. A small sloop was wrecked and the mark buoys carried away.

San Juan, P. R., Sept. 9th.—The following issued by Weather Bureau. Sept. 9th: Tropical storm centre about 200 miles S. E. from island of Porto Rico at noon, moving W. N. W. at rate of about 12 miles per hour, moderate to strong wind with rain probably along south coast of Porto Rico tonight.

Grenada, Sept. 9th.—Government unable to get reliable details of damage in country districts by last night's storm, all telephone lines being down. No deaths reported but heavy damage to coa estates western seaboard and several houses damaged. Sloop Eva from Martinique to Venezuela with explosives in distress became a total wreck last night back of Government Garage, St. Georges.

St. Lucia, Sept. 9th—Heavy rains and high winds prevailed all day yesterday and during night, Bar. falling to 29.68. Telegraph lines damaged and telephone communication with other districts interrupted. Owing to rough sea coast boat unable to communicate with leeward towns. Sloop "Intrepid" total loss, Choiseul schooner Lillian M. Barns arrived this p. m. from Barbados reports having been blown away from there.

St. Kitts, Sept. 10th—During yesterday the sea began to get heavy and during the evening and night broke with great force over the seawall and bay front. The Statia sloop "Gladys" and every sail boat and lighter in the harbour have been driven ashore and most of them are a total loss. The sea is still very heavy but abating.

Barbados, Sept. 10th—Guiana returned to port 6 p. m. yesterday. Canadian Beaver returned during the night.

St. Thomas, Sept. 10th.—Advices from San Juan, P. R., state that telegraph and telephone communication with Ponce and Mayaguez is interrupted, the last news from Ponce at 10 p. m. yesterday saying the force of the wind was then terrible. It is reported that Humacao and Yabucac have suffered some damage and many lighters and tow boats sunk. It is believed the storm passed Porto Rico during the night with increased intensity and considerably spread in extent and much closer to the island than was expected. No word has yet been received from Ponce by cable and cable communication north of San Juan is temporarily suspended by all routes.

Dominica, Sept. 10th.—Heavy seas which were experienced here yesterday caused serious damage to the Jetties and Seaboard both at Roseau and Portsmouth. Some houses at Portsmouth also suffered. A motor launch was sunk in the roadstead of Roseau, all other craft having left the day before for safer anchorages.

Barbados, Sept. 10th—The damage done by the weather on Thursday was extensive. Both houses and palings along the St. Lawrence and Hastings coast were washed away. Several per-
