The Governor is expected today on the Vixen to attend a meeting of the Colonial Council. The Navy band is to leave by the ship for St. Thomas where it is expected to be stationed about a month. During its absence it is hoped the Municipal Bands will lose no opportunity to fill the vacancy and afford entertainment to which the public has become very much attached.

The installation of Revd. Hughe Henry as pastor of the Moravian Church Frederickstad was effected at the forenoon service yesterday. Revd. Wolter opening the service which was very impressive throughout, the new minister delivering the sermon and Revd. Wolter closing with a farewell address during which the entire congregation was deeply touched.

The theatre offers a new serial for this evening, and as far as can be learnt there is every reason to expect to see something grand and interesting. A full house is looked for.

A meeting convened by Mr. A. H. Ogaard and held in Moravian School house on Friday night last was, as stated in our first reference to it, poorly attended. That is perhaps attributable to the fact that few people were thoroughly conversant with the subject which the meeting had considered. The forenoon talk

to ascertain what it was all about. This has been taken into consideration by the promoter and others interested in the scheme of extending to Christiansted the organization recently founded in the country at a meeting in the Midland Moravian School House, under the name of the St. Croix Cooperative Loan Association, and it was decided at the meeting on Friday night that greater publicity as to the form and object of the society should be taken up, and another meeting held on the 16th. instant at a more central point in town when it is hoped that the attendance will be representative and favor the enrolment of members which was postponed on account of the small gathering at last meeting.

Speaking on Friday night the Revd. Mr. Barrow who was elected chairman of the meeting after the same had been declared open by Mr. Ogaard, praised the idea of such a society as that contemplated and referred to kindred organizations in the British Islands where they achieve a high degree of success and prove of great benefit to their members. Mr. Ogaard then spoke in detail on the projected aims and intentions of the society to be able to acquire means and invest the same to general advantage or help members desiring means to invest, and thus further the development of co-operation or individual interest as the case may be. So far, it is thought to have the membership divided into four grades, say A. B. C. and D., the first

to pay monthly contributions of \$2., the second of \$1., the third of 50 cents and a fourth for children to pay about 25 cents. It is pretty clear, we think, that the establishment of such a society and its proper upkeep will demand the cooperation and lasting effort and zeal of its officers and members, and the far-reaching benefits to be derived from such a society being only too apparent and inducive to require much presentation, we can only trust that the advisability of giving full support from all quarters will urge an enthusiastic participation in the next meeting and a large roll of membership among those who can be depended upon to back the thing up.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Feb. 22nd.—A Russian Wireless message received here, dealing with the Moscow Soviet election, says that of 574 deputies whose election has been definitely decided, 542 were Bolshevik candidates.

Paris, Feb. 22nd.—Airplanes are to be used in French Guiana for the transport of gold from the mines at St. Laurent Du Maroni, which is separated from the Coast towns by a one hundred mile belt of almost impenetrable forest. Canoes have hitherto been used.

London, February 21st.—The London "Times" airplane, competing in the Cairo to Capetown Flight, left Mongalla in the lower Soudan yesterday morning for Menge, in the province of Busoga, Uganda.

Washington, Feb. 21st.—Congress has received still another presidential disability bill for consideration. It is proposed that thirty consecutive days absence from the United States, or disability through illness for a like period on the part of the President, would cause the Vice-President to assume the duties of the office.

London, Feb. 21st.—Lord Reading has definitely declined the ambassadorship at Washington and the post has been offered to Sir Auckland Geddes, who has not yet accepted it, according to the "Daily Mail". but it is believed by that News paper that he will accept it rather than continue as Minister of National Service and carry on relief work.

Constantinople, Feb. 21st.—Thirty thousand refugees are waiting at Russian Black Sea Ports for permission by the Allied High Commissioners to come to Turkey.

New York, Feb. 21st.—Recent heavy gold shipments to South America were explained yesterday by the statement that London was drawing on reserves here to make payment for purchases of grain and hides. The total amount shipped approximates thirty million pesos.

London, Feb. 21st.—The "Daily Chronicle" learns that a syndicate has proposed
