them and keeping up their spirits. Another able-bodied seaman when under the tropical sun and the meagre rations were being served out, sang "I'd like to have some ham and eggs please". The crew of the Trevesa are unanimous in attributing their safety to the tact, cheerfulness and strictness of Captain Foster and his officers. They declare that the steering of the crowded open boat to a previously decided pinpoint on the ocean, 1,800 miles away with only two sextants and a wrist watch on board, was an act of seamanship which calls for the admiration of the world.

Brussels, July 3rd.—The Belgium answer to the British questionnaire on the Franco-Belgium reparations policy has been sent to the Belgium Ambassador in London, who is expected to deliver it to Lord Curzon this afternoon.

London, July 3rd.—A dockers strike which began in Hull yesterday and extended to Bristol and Cardiff in the afternoon, now is affecting London docks. The strike, which has not been authorized by the trade union leaders, was started in Hull as a protest against the reduction of one shilling per day in the wages of the operatives, by a national agreement. At Hull 7,000 men are out and the port is completely tied up. Several cargo boats which arrived in the Thames this morning were similarly held up under the same conditions as those prevailing at the other ports.

Dieppe France, July 3rd.—James Ockenden, the British professional, won the French open golf championship here yesterday, aggregating 288 for four rounds.

Sydney, N. S., July 3rd.—The 8,000

coal miners of Cape Breton left their work at midnight, in support of the striking Sydney steel workers and to force the withdrawal from the Sydney strike area of the provincial police and federal troops now employed in protecting the plants of the British Empire Steel Co. and maintaining law and order. Union officials announced that the strike is a "100 percent" affair, which means that pumpmen and maintenance men have walked out with the others and left the pits today. The company has been notified that the miners will allow a reasonable time tonight and tomorrow for the removal of the horses from the pits. Most of the horses were brought to the surface tonight, in preparation for a strike, but a considerable number still remain underground. The walkout of the miners completes the tie up in the Allied coal-steel industry of the island and brings the number of strikers up to a figure in excess of 10,000.

Sydney, N. S., July 3rd.—H. M. S. Wistaria arrived here from St. Johns, Newfoundland today.

London, July 4th.—The dockers strike at Cardiff, against the wage cut of a shilling a day, has resulted in twenty ships being held up at the Welsh port. Besides Cardiff eight ports are affected by a similar strike, including the dockers strike in London.

London, July 5th.—Yesterday saw the commencement of the three days match between the touring West Indian cricket team and the Nottinghamshire XI at Nottingham. Nottinghamshire went in to bat first, occupying most of the playing time and compiling a score of 363

before being disposed of. The West Indians then went in to bat and at the close of play scored 30 for the loss of no wickets. Following are the scores: Nottinghamshire first innings. Gunn 65, Walker 26, Hardstaff 10, Carr, 35, Payton 84, Turner 54, Kirk 51, Flint 0, Barratt 6, Oates 0, Richmond not out 2, extras 11, total 363. Bowling for West Indians John took one wicket for 79 runs, Francis three for 66, Browne one 90 and Small five for 93. West Indians first innings. Browne not out 10, Dewhurst not out 19, extras 1, total 30.

Lausanne, July 4th.—Replying to Ismet Pasha's protest, the Allies have accepted his challenge to discuss at one sitting of the Near Eastern conference all the outstanding questions as soon as the final instructions are received from their respective Governments. They also deprecated Ismet's action in communicating his protest to the press before sending it to the Allies.

London, July 4th.—Count Karolyi, ex-Premier of Hungary, arrived at Cardiff, Wales, yesterday with his wife and three children, says the Daily Express. The Count is taking his family to Canada, where he intends to pass the remainder of his life.

Lethbridge, Alberta, July 4th.—Near-est estimate of the damage done by Sunday evening's big hail storm, which cut a swath approximately one hundred and fifty miles by five miles, is the guess that the crop will be cut down to the extent of one million dollars. Under certain weather conditions it may be much more and may be much less.

Sydney, N. S., July 4th.—With over 10,500 men on strike in the Cape Breton industrial area, the night passed without serious disturbances, so far as police and municipal officials have been able to ascertain this morning.

New York, July 4th.—The United States is today celebrating "Independence Day" with military and naval exercises. At Portland, Oregon, the H.M.S. Curlew will fire a salute in honour of President Harding while the presidential train is crossing the Willamette river bridge, beneath which the Curlew is anchored. For a British man-of-war to celebrate the fourth of July by saluting the President of the United States is believed to set a precedent.

Brussels, July 4th.—The Minister of Defence has imposed a fine of twenty billion paper marks on the town of Dairbury on account of recent crimes there.

Demerara, July 4th.—A disastrous fire occurred on Monday night at New Amsterdam, Berbice, when a large portion of the buildings in Pitt Street business houses and residences etc. were destroyed. A Chinese woman and her three children were burned to death. Damage is estimated at two hundred thousand dollars a goodly portion is understood to be covered by insurance.
