TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Cork, March 30th.—At a special meeting of the Corporation tonight, Mr. Albert Terence MacSweeney was elected Lord Mayor. He is a Sinn Feiner and has several times been deported or imprisoned.

London, March 30th.—The Allied Powers have accepted Holland's note regarding the former German Emperor, according to an Amsterdam despatch to the Daily Mail.

San Francisco, March 30th.—Mr. Hoover today telegraphed to the Hoover Republican Club of California that he would accept the Republican nomination for the President.

Copenhagen, March 30th.—It is learned on the best authority that a general strike in protest against a new ministry will begin at noon Wednesday. A crowd estimated to number two hundred thousand attended a meeting tonight, organized by the Socialists, in protest against the action of King Christian in dissolving the Zahle Cabinet. There were lively scenes in the streets last night and cries were raised of "Revolution" and "Down with the King, Long live the Danish Republic". But these were intermingled with cries for the King, and later the appearance of two squadrons of Hussars had a calming effect. Strong guards were posted outside the Palace and the King took his customary ride unattended this morning.

New York, March 30th.—The action of President Wilson's Coal Commission in granting the bituminous mine workers a wage increase of twenty-seven per cent means that the price of coal at the mines will advance from sixty-five cents to one dollar and twenty-five cents per ton, the bituminous coal operators announced today.

Washington, March 30th. The vigorous expression of President Wilson's opinion that the often expressed intention of the Allies that the anomaly of the Turks in Europe should cease, and that it should be carried out in framing the Turkish treaty, characterizes the American rejoinder to the recent Allied note, transmitting information as to the status of the treaty negotiations. While the strength of the arguments for the retention of the Turks at Constantinople is recognized, the reply says, the American Govt. believes that the arguments against it are strong, and contain certain imperative
