

Christiansted Theatre. No Show Thursday.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

(Continued from yesterday's Avis.)

The Vice-Chairman remarked: I am sure that Honorable Members will agree with me that the discussion on this matter has been sufficiently protracted. I will now put to the vote whether the Amendment should be furthered.

It was put to the vote and unanimously carried that the Amendment be furthered.

It was also put to the vote and carried that a committee of 5 members be appointed to receive and report on the Amendment.

The Vice-Chairman remarked: According to the Rules of Business a recess of five minutes must be given before the committee is appointed.

The Vice-Chairman gave a recess of five minutes.

After recess the Council reassembled and the Vice-Chairman asked members to prepare their voting tickets for a committee of five to receive and report on Bill No. 47.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (Andersen) would like to know whether the member to serve on the Educational Board of Review should not be elected first?

The Vice-Chairman answered: That will come up after.

12 voting tickets were handed in for a committee of 5 members to receive and report on Bill No. 47.

Elected were: 1st Member for Christiansted Country District (Stakemann) with 11 votes, 2nd Appointed Member (Noll) with 10 votes, 2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) with 9 votes, 1st Appointed Member (Henderson) with 7 votes.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (Andersen) and 2nd Member for said District (M. M. Skeoch) received 6 votes respectively, 5th Appointed Member (Lunney) with 5 votes.

1st Member for Frederiksted Town (Coulter) and 4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) received 2 votes respectively and 4th Member for Christiansted Country District (Ramsay) and 3rd Appointed Member (Armstrong) one vote respectively.

Members Andersen and M. M. Skeoch

had a tie vote and therefore a new free voting had to take place.

9 voting tickets were handed in.

Elected was: 1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (Andersen) with 5 votes.

5th Appointed Member (Lunney) received 3 votes, and 2nd Member for Frederiksted Country District (M. M. Skeoch) received 1 vote.

The Vice-Chairman remarked: Regarding the question of the member to serve on the Educational Board of Review, I will ask members to give their consent to bring the matter on the Order of the Day today.

The consent was given.

The Vice-Chairman then asked members to prepare their voting tickets for the election of a member to serve on the Educational Board of Review.

12 voting tickets were handed in.

Elected was: 1st Member for Christiansted Country District (Stakemann) with 10 votes.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (F. Andersen) and 2nd Member for said District (M. M. Skeoch) received 1 vote respectively.

The Vice-Chairman remarked: Before the meeting is closed I wish to ask members to remain as there is a private matter which I would like to put before the Council.

The audience retired and the doors were closed, and the matter was discussed.

At 5.30 p. m. the doors were opened and there being no further business before the House the Vice-Chairman declared the meeting closed.

The permission accorded the Sanitation Service to give a cine exhibition at the theatre this evening as advertised having been withdrawn, it is requested to announce that the show has been postponed until further.

A MUCH-NEEDED-WARNING.—Some clergymen in the Church of England (says M.
