of the driver of the "death wagon" which was abandoned near the Assay Office just before the detonation took place and which is believed to have carried the time bomb that caused the disaster. A revised list of the dead tonight showed that 34 persons had lost their lives as a result of the explosion. Robery Pope, the brother-in-law of Edwin Fischer, who sent post card warnings of the disaster to friends in the financial district, was questioned for nearly two hours today at the Dept. of Justice. Chief Flynn would not disclose the nature of the investigation or say whether Pope had come voluntarily or in answer to a summons. Fischer who already has been adjudged mentally incompetent by a lunacy commission in Hamilton Ont. is on his way to New York where he will be questioned as to his knowledge of the blast. Chief Flynn declared that there were no new developments in the case tonight although his men were working on several leads and hoped for definite results.

Limerick, Ireland, Sept. 19th.—A constabulary patrol was ambushed near Abbeyfeale today. A constable was killed and the chief constable and another constable were wounded.

London, Sept. 19th.—Mr. MacSweeney passed a somewhat better night, having two hours sleep which seemed to have refreshed him slightly. Otherwise Mac Sweeney's condition is much the same today as yesterday. He is extremely weak but not quite so exhausted and is still conscious.

Paris, Sept. 19th.—Finland and Sweden have agreed to accept the intervention of the League of Nations for the settlement of the dispute between them as to the possession of the Aland Islands, lying at the mouth of the Gulf of Bothnia between the two countries. The acceptance of the council as arbitrator is regarded by the members of the council as a long step toward the recognition of the League by the Nations of the world as a medium for the prevention of future wars.

Montreal, Sept. 19th.—A new trade route to India from Montreal in Summer time and from a maritime point in Winter time to be operated jointly between the Canadian Govt. Merchant Marine Limited, and the British India Steam Navigating Company of England was announced on Saturday. It will be a corollary of the service announced in connection with India and the Far East in conjunction with the Alfred Holt Company. With these two agreements the Canadian Govt. Merchant Marine will now enjoy throughout the Far East the benefit of two powerful shipping organizations.

Belfast, Sept. 19th.—Soldiers who had been in ambush since early morning surprised a body of Sinn Feiners at bombing practice in the hills today. One republican was killed and two

were wounded and thirty five captured.

Belfast, September 19th.—Sir Hamar Greenwood, Chief Secretary for Ireland, has informed the magistrates of County Lough that he can hold out no hope that the Govt. will reverse its decision in the case of Lord Mayor Mac Sweeney on hunger strike in Brixton Prison. The magistrates recently sent a communication to Sir Hamar demanding full self Government for Ireland with powers no less comprehensive than those enjoyed by any dominion and calling for the immediate release of Mayor MacSweeney.

Stockholm, Sept. 19th.—The peace treaty between Russia and Finland is to be signed on Monday at Dorpat says a Helsingfors despatch to the "Dagens Nyheter."

Toronto, Sept. 19th.—The formation of an Imperial Cabinet was forecasted in the address of Lord Desborough, President of the Chamber of Commerce of the British Empire.

Warsaw, Sept. 20th.—Russian Bolshevik forces have been driven out of Eastern Galicia by a general Polish advance along the southern frontier, an official communication issued by the Polish War Office on Saturday said. "Our detachments have driven the enemy across the Stripa and have broken their resistance. They are approaching the Sereth after the capture of Zloczow Biala Kanien and Olesko and the occupation of the Styr and Stockhod rivers. Our pursuit of the enemy forces is being continued. In the region of Kobrin the enemy attacked fiercely

but vainly. It has been observed that the Lithuanians are reinforcing their troops which proves that their declaration of peaceful designs are lacking in sincerity.
