Governor Oman has ordered a court of inquiry into the circumstances attending the death of Edward E. Mitchell on Saturday while working in connection with deepening the haul-over.

Collector of Customs Boardman has received instructions from Hon. J. H. Moyle, Secretary of the Treasury in Washington, directing him to enforce the local laws regarding intoxicating liquors. The Government of the Virgin Islands has heretofore contended the local laws were applicable.

The trip of the U. S. S. Vixen to San Juan has been postponed until after the arrival of the U. S. S. Hancock which is expected Wednesday, and she sailed this morning with supplies for the Marine Barracks, Christiansted.

The remains of Leslie J. Moore, Seaman, U. S. Navy, who while serving on subchaser No. 72 was accidentally killed by falling from a cliff at Krum Bay, St. Thomas last Thursday, will be forwarded to the United States via first available transportation.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Nov. 27th.—The top of Mont Blanc fell off three days ago and started an enormous avalanche, which rolled down into Italy along the Gorge of the Brenva Glacier, destroying in its course the whole forest of Pour Toud. The origin of the avalanche was unknown

until yesterday when the weather cleared and powerful telescopes could be brought to bear on the mountain. Then it was found that part of the limestone pyramid which forms the summit of the greatest mountain mass in Europe had split and fallen.

London, Nov. 27th.—The erection of barriers 8 feet high, which will exclude the public from Downing Street and adjacent Charles Street, was begun last night with instructions that the work should be continued until completed. Both streets lead from Whitehall to a group of Government Departmental Offices, including the Foreign Office and the India Office and also the official residences of Mr. Lloyd George and Mr. Bonar Law. The barriers are to be of a substantial character, foundations having been dug to receive them. Gates wide enough to admit an automobile are to be provided for in the barriers. At the same time the light barriers raised at the other end of the two streets to check the pressure of the crowds on the occasion of the unveiling of the cenotaph for the men killed in the war, are being strengthened. Nothing has been announced publicly regarding the unusual precautions, which are assumed in some quarters to indicate that the Govt. has reason to expect an attempt on the centres of Government from quarters which at present can only be surmised.

Washington, Nov. 28th.—An earthquake of moderate intensity beginning at 6.43 a. m. and ending 7.30 a. m. was registered today by the Georgetown University seismograph. The area of the disturbance was about 2,000 miles from Washington.

London, Nov. 27th.—Prince Arthur of Connaught, the new Governor General of South Africa, has had a splendid reception in Pretoria, according to reports received here. It is understood that the South African elections will take place towards the end of January.

Dublin, Nov. 28th.—Cardinal Logue, the Primate of Ireland, in a pastoral letter read today in the churches of the Arch-Diocese, denounced the murders in Ireland, and declared that if a balance were struck between last Sunday's assassinations of officers and the shooting by the policemen in Croke Park he believed "it should be given against the forces of the Crown". The cardinal's letter scathingly arraigns the methods the Govt. are pursuing, but warns the people "against an association, secret or open, which would lead them into any disorders or crimes". The cardinal in the letter says the ardent hopes of the Irish people for peace are shared by European and other countries. In support of this he cites a letter from the Archbishop of Malines and all the Bishops in Belgium, conveying their cordial sympathy to the Irish people. The pastoral proceeds to condemn in the strongest terms Sunday's tragedies, declaring the belief that every
