TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Wimbledon, England, June 30th.—The outstanding British who remain in the Wimbledon shingles as a result of matches on Saturday are Major Kingscote, of England, and Raymond, of South Africa. Lacoste and Borotra, of France, and the Belgian, Washer, also are in the running. The invading stars from the United States will have a strong contingent, including Vincent Richards, Williams and Watson Washburn. Overshadowing the mens play for the week was the apparently unbeatable work of the famous Lenglen, five times winner of the Wimbledon women championship. Besides Miss Wills, the other invading survivors in the womens play are Miss Elizabeth Ryan, now resident in England, and Mrs. Jessup. The British have still Mrs. Satter Thwaite, Miss Kathleen McKane, Mrs. Barron and Mrs. Colgate.

Tokio, July 1st.—The nation wide demonstration against the United States Exclusion Act which goes into effect today opened with mass prayer meetings at all the national shrines throughout the country. Crowds petitioned the ancient deities to aid the people in this troublesome time when the Japanese race is insulted by exclusion from the United States. Patriotic societies last evening placarded virtually every telephone and telegraph pole in the city with the following: "Japanese must never forget July 1st, when America inflicted an intolerable insult on Japan. Always remember the date. Prepare for such steps as are demanded by the honor of the fatherland when the occasion comes. Every Japanese must remember the following rules. 1. Alter your mode of living, so as to im-

press the date lastingly upon your mind. 2. Hate everything American, but remain kind to American industrials. 3. Deny yourself all luxury. 4. Never forget national honour for private gain. 5. Never enter a church supported or guided by Americans or United States Missionaries." Both Houses of the Diet at their first sittings of the current session today and almost as their first business passed resolutions strongly opposing the action of the United States prohibiting the entry of Japanese. The passages of the resolution in each instance followed the presentation of addresses by the Premier, Viscount Kato and the Foreign Minister, Baron Shidehara.
