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York, were the guests of the city of Albany last night. A trip through the capital and the Education Building was preceded by a banquet. The officers will inspect the general electric plant at Schenectady today.

New York, Nov. 13th.—Representatives of thirty races in the United States will assemble on H. M. S. "Renown" on the North River next Tuesday afternoon to pay their respects to the Prince of Wales and present a living picture of the variety of races that go to make up America's life. The meeting has been arranged by the Interracial Council through its committee on International Affairs, of which Mr. David Ramsey is chairman. It is expected to be one of the most picturesque incidents in the American itinerary of the Prince. The following are the racial groups that will be represented in the delegation to call on the Prince. Armenian, Belgian, British, Canadian, Carpatho-Russian, Chinese, Czech-Slovak, Danish, Dutch, Estonian, Finnish, French, Greek, Hispanica, Italian, Japanese, Jewish, Jugoslav, Lithuanian, Magyar, Norwegian, Polish, Portuguese, Rumanian, Swedish, Syrian, Ukrainian.

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 14th.—Major Charles W. Gordon ("Ralph Conno") of Winnipeg in addressing the delegates to the world's christian citizenship conference here yesterday, dwelt upon the significance of the war as a refining factor in the lives of men "that red smear of blood," he said, "brought us a great spiritual unity". The cause of the unrest in the world today, he ascribed to the fact that men will not recognize that a new order of things have come into being, and are trying to run the world". They have not yet grasped the notion that in all ways the world is new". Calls to make the world saloonless were made also at the conference.

London, Nov. 14th. The Bolshevik captured Yeamburg, 68 miles southwest of Petrograd, this afternoon, according to wireless despatch received this evening from Moscow.

Toronto, Nov. 14th. Canada has only rolled up a total of \$37,739,250 for the Victory Loan, making the grand total to date \$478,795,800.

Dublin, Nov. 13th.—The Sinn Fein members of the House of Commons who were arrested in raids on the offices of the Sinn Fein Parliament, were arraigned in the Police Court yesterday on the charge of participating in forbidden proceedings. They refused to recognize the court, and each was sentenced to two months imprisonment.

Washington, Nov. 14th.—A special committee of the International Labour Conference has decided in favour of an International Convention for a General 48 hour week. The decision was reached

by a majority vote, the labour delegates constituting a minority. Labour men are endeavouring to have the question reopened in Committee that they may make further suggestions throughout the sittings of the Committee. They have stood for a maximum eight hour day, but have not so far succeeded in their point. Senator Robertson, Minister of Labour has however, it is understood, a compromise proposal for consideration. Under this proposal the convention would still be on a forty-eight hour basis, but working hours on any individual day would be limited to nine.

New York Nov. 14th.—Two able bodied seamen of the crew of the battle-cruiser Renown, were lost at sea last Sunday morning when the Renown, ploughing through a gale, was coming here from Trinidad to take the Prince of Wales home. A midshipman was taken from the battle-cruiser to the Presbyterian Hospital with both legs broken as a result of the tempestuous weather.

Ottawa, Nov. 14th.—On account of complaints regarding the sugar shortage, the Canadian Trade Commission telegraphed 13 representative Boards of Trade and wholesale grocer associations of Canada, stating that yellow sugar was available for immediate delivery. The representatives have shown no evidence of a sugar famine, but some objection was made to the proportion of yellow sugar offered. It would appear that the problem was one of high living rather than high cost of living. The Canadian Trade Commission is convinced that the clamour for more sugar is due largely to people insisting on getting all granulated sugar to the practical exclusion of yellow.

Paris, Nov. 14th.—The Allies policy concerning Russia was unchanged, it was said semi-officially today, following the return of M. Pichon, Foreign Minister from London. It was said that the Russian Government which are leading the fighting against Bolsheviks are sufficiently supplied with money, ammunition and food for several months. Neither France nor Great Britain, it was stated, would make any further sacrifices, but on the other hand neither of them would open negotiations of any nature tending to strengthen Bolshevism. The question of Turkey was discussed by M. Pichon. Mr. Lloyd George, Mr. Churchill and Mr. Balfour during M. Pichon's visit to London. It is understood that Great Britain and France decided to act in common in the deliverance from Turkish domination of countries not Turkish, and the protection of nationalities scattered throughout the ex-Turkish Empire.

Portsmouth, Nov. 15th.—Lady Astor, who is a candidate for member of Parliament, was one of the first women to vote after the opening of the polls here today. There is great activity throughout the division.
