MEN OUTNUMBER WOMEN

A statement issued by the census bureau's shows that the United States as a whole has about 2,000,000 more men than women. However, seven states and the District of Columbia show a preponderance of women. In the District the ratio is 87 men for every 100 women. Although 2,000,000 excess males sounds alarming every census has shown from 103 to 106 males to 100 females. This condition is partly due to immigration, which adds males to America and takes them from

Europe. But the chief cause is Nature, which provides a surplus from which to draw when infant diseases (more fatal to boys than girls), war and work have deleted the ranks of mere man.—*Pathfinder, July 23rd.*

GROWS PATRIOTIC CORN
