affairs to feel concerned in the present crisis, and it is sincerely hoped that the grave prospect of a return of the time when we had streets dimly lit by lamps; that smoked to the extent where they often shed no light whatever, and our houses were lighted by kerosine oil, will not materialize. The electric lighting system in Christiansted has not been perfect; like in many concerns in their infancy, there has been room for improvement in various features of our electric light establishment; but this is true of other undertakings operated under more lucrative conditions permitting of constant efforts to perfect, and it must be confessed that under any circumstances it will be missed if taken away. There is no housewife who is interested in her home comforts, or anyone who appreciates lack of drudgery and hails for conveniences who will want to revert to the filling and cleaning of lamps, the trimming of wicks, and the this and that, so burdensome where electricity is absent. Back of all this, however it must be remembered that we live in an age of advancement when progress is not creeping along like a caterpillar, and in event the D. W. I. Electric Co. does discontinue business, someone else may enter this line and supply our wants. The Municipal Committee should be given the benefit of rational judgment, and while criticism is mostly healthy, it should be exercised guardedly until the object of censure has shown absolute occasion for condemnation. It appears to us unlikely that the chances of losing the electric lighting system would be jeopardized without due provision having been made, and it is our conviction that such will not prove the case.
