TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Toronto, July 26th.—The Australians
double match, in the first round of the
Davis cup competition from Canada in
three straight sets 6-3, 6-1. This gave
them the right to meet the British team
at Pittsburg in the second round next
week.

London, July 27th.—Mustapha Kemal
Pasha, head of the Turkish Nationalists
Government, has sent a telegram to
Constantinople asking that the Central
Government intervene with the Ailles in
an effort to obtain a cessation of Greek
Turkish hostilities, according to des-
patches from Constantinople to the Ex-
change Telegraph Company.

Washington, July 27th. The reduc-
tion of the United States army to a peace
time strength of one hundred and fifty
thousand men will be accomplished by
the end of July, in accordance with the
decision of Congress, when it refused to
appropriate funds for pay of a greater
force after October 1st. With the reduc-
tion, Secretary Weeks announced, there
would be a general redistribution of
troops, practical abandonment of the
great war time army cantonments,
placement of many organizations on the
inactive list, and the Skeletonizing of
others into materially reduced strength.

London, July 26th.—The British selec-
tions for the international six metre
races in which Great Britain and the
United States will compete for the Brit-
ish American Cup, have been made, the
trials having been completed on Satur-
day. The entrance will be the Jeap,
owned by Sir J. H. Ward, the Holly,
owned by Mr. Gould, the Victoria, owned
by Sir Godfrey Collins and Capt. Burton,
skipper of Sir Thomas Lipton's Sham-
rock and the Flys, owned by Mr. Parker.
The races will be divided between Cowes
and Ryde.

Washington, July 27th.—A formal de-
mand for the release of United States
prisoners in Canada has been made on
the Soviet authorities by Secretary
Hughes. The State Department was
advised today that the communication
had been handed to the Soviet represent-
ative at Reval yesterday by the consul
Albrecht.

New York, July 27th.—The raw sugar
market was firm early today at three
cents for Cuba's, cost and freight, equal
to 4.61 for centrifugal. In refined, prices
were advanced ten points by local refin-
ers to 6.00 for fine granulated. Others
were unchanged at 5.85 to 5.90 with the
demand not quite so active. Refiners
are pretty well sold up and few are able
to make prompt delivery.

Constantinople, July 27th.—The Turk-
ish Prime Minister, Fevzi Pasha, told
the national assembly that although the
Turks had been obliged to yield ground
in the face of the Greek advance, the
enemy suffered terrible losses. The re-
gion between Kutaia and Eskişehir,
which recently was captured by the
Greeks was covered with thousands of
bodies, he declared. The Prime Minis-
ter warned the assembly against panic,
asserting that every precaution had been
taken to secure a successful continua-
tion of the struggle, which he said was
entering the decisive phase. A Greek
warship today approached Samsun, on
the south shore of the Black sea with
the intention of bombarding the town,
but the commander of a United States
destroyer lying off the coast dissuaded
its commander from firing, pointing out
that such action might endanger the
Greek population. The Greek destroy-
er "Panther" opened fire today on Tre-
bizond, on the Black sea coast, to the
