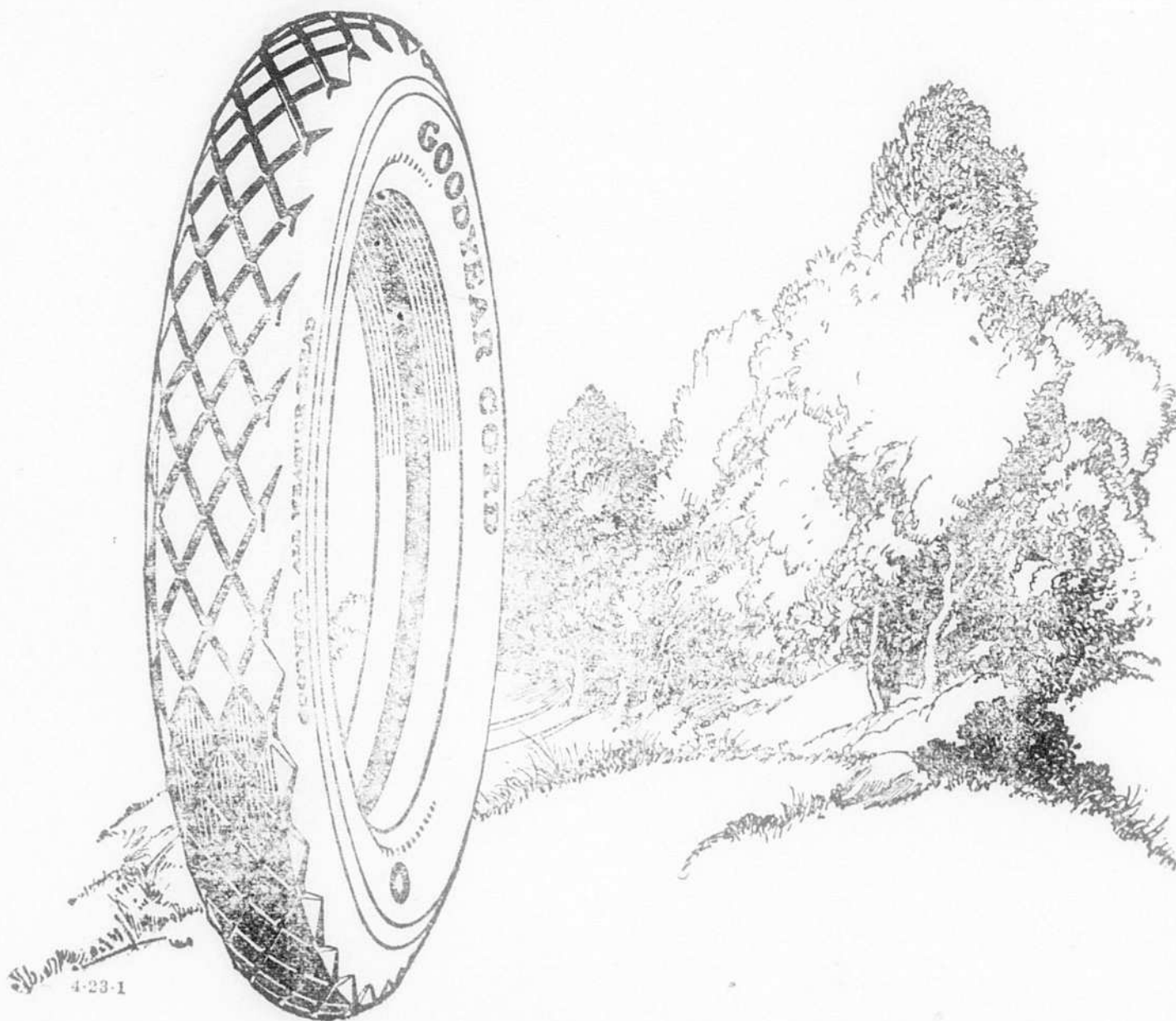
ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Feb. 19th.—Regulations have been issued in the Province of Constantinople, according to the Daily Mail correspondent, making a medical examination compulsory in the cases of all persons intending to marry. The doctors' report must be accepted by the Municipal authorities before marriage will be allowed.

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 19th.—The subsidized service to Bermuda, West Indies and Demerara now held by the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company will expire on March 31st next. Information has been received by the representative here of the R. M. S. P. Coy to the effect that arrangements have been made for a continuation of the contract with them for a period of twelve months ending March 31st 1925, on the same terms and conditions as under the present contract.

London, Feb. 19th.—While the employers claim some slight improvement in the dock strike situation today, so far as London is concerned, there are no signs of a let up at other ports in the United Kingdom. About three thousand men are still working at the docks, which is less than one-fifth the normal figure.

London, Feb. 20th.—Important developments in the dock workers strike situation are expected this afternoon. It is believed that the employments are reconsidering their attitude and that there is every likelihood of a meeting being held resulting in the immediate resumption of direct negotiations with the Union, with favorable prospect of a settlement.



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
