TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Oct. 8th. -The pressure of
the unemployment problem is increasing
and anxiety is being manifested by la-
bour organization, manufacturers and
the public, regarding the plan which
the Govt. is formulating to deal with
it. A joint conference of labour leaders
yesterday accepted the Prime Ministers
invitation to advise the Cabinet next
week on the question, but the labourites
revealed, in an exchange of communi-
cations with Mr. Lloyd George their
thir desire to begin discussions immedi-
ately. They consented merely to exam-
ine the Govt's. proposal, explicitly dis-
associating themselves from responsi-
bilitv for the policy to be adopted by
the Govt. Mr. Ben Tillett, Labour mem-
ber of Parliament, and organizer of the
Dockers union of which for many years
he has been general secretary, in a
manifesto last night, declared, "Bank-
ruptcy stares us in the face. This Win-
ter will be the testing time for the
working of the organization. Every
form of Govt is in a state of panic, and
whether it will be an imperial or na-
tional Govt. disaster, impinges on the
administration, but whatever the chaos
of accumulated debts, labour and indus-
try will have to meet the impact." He
urged the cooperation of all trade
unions to compel Govt. assistance.

London, Oct. 8th.--The design of the
ZR2, which came to grief in the Humber
at Hull last month, shou'd have been
examined and discussed by an official
competent committee before its actual
construction was commenced, declared a
report of the court of inquiry, which
investigated the disaster. The report
adds that there is no evidence to show
that this was done and finds that the
accident was due to structural weakness.
The opinion of the court is that the air-
ship, while flying approximately 1200
feet over the river, broke in two, due to
the failure of the structure to the rear
of the after engine cars while being
subjected to control tests. The findings
of the court of inquiry confirm evidence
introduced at the inquest into the disas-
ter. They say that fire, probably origin-
ating from a spark from electric wires,
was m inly responsible for the large loss
of life. They note that a quick reversal
was being made at the time of the acci-
dent, bringing a heavy strain on the
after portion of the hull of the craft, due
to the swing of the stern. The court,
while finding that there was one para-
chute available for every person on
board the ZR2, asserts that no survivor
in the disaster owed his escape to a
parachute.
