

tices upon taxpayers or take other steps for the enforcement of the payment of taxes when they shall have been expressly directed by the Secretary.

PREFERENCE TO TAXES OVER OTHER DEBTS.

Section 54.—In settlement of the estates of bankrupts, assignees for the benefit of creditors and decedents, the taxes owing by such estates shall be preferred before all other debts except funeral expenses. No executor or administrator of the estate of a decedent shall divide or distribute, such estate until all the taxes due thereon are paid, and no registrar shall record any instrument of a will or partition of the property of any decedent upon which the taxes have not been paid, and administrators, executors or registrars of property violating this section shall be liable to the Municipality for the taxes not collected because of such violation. It shall be the duty of the receiver or other assignee of the estate of any bankrupt or insolvent person to first pay out of the estate of such bankrupt or insolvent person all taxes due therefrom to the extent of value of said estate. No bankrupt shall be discharged and no assignee shall receive any discharge, compensation or commission until said taxes shall have been so paid.

PAYMENT OF TAXES BY HOLDER OF LIEN AND LESSEE.

Section 55.—Any person having a lien upon property may pay the taxes and surcharges thereon at any time after said taxes become delinquent and the same shall be added to his or her lien and be recovered with the rate of interest borne by the lien. A tenant or lessee of real property may pay the taxes and surcharges thereon at any time after the same have become delinquent and may deduct the same from the rent.

LIST OF DELINQUENT TAXPAYERS.

Section 56.—Within thirty days after the date on which taxes become delinquent, each collector shall prepare a list of delinquent taxpayers within his district, showing for each the assessment of the property upon which taxes are due and unpaid and the amount of taxes due thereon and shall append to each list a notice stating that, unless said delinquent taxes, together with the interest provided for by Section 52, are paid within a period of twenty days from the date of said notice, the property of said taxpayer will be attached and sold in the manner hereinafter provided. One copy of said list, with notice attached, shall be sent by the collector to the Secretary, and one copy published, and posted in the form and place provided for by section 53 of this Ordinance.

ATTACHMENT OF PROPERTY FOR TAXES.

Section 57.—If any person neglects or refuses to pay his or her taxes within the period prescribed in section 56 of

this Ordinance, the collector or any other duly deputized agent of the Secretary shall, after the written consent of the Secretary shall have been obtained, proceed to collect the same by the attachment and sale of the property of such debtor, in the manner hereinafter provided.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, July 1st.—Raw sugar futures were former on covering prompted by the announcement that the Cuban Govt. has decided to purchase a million tons of Cuban and withdraw from the market in order to relieve the situation.

London, July 3rd.—The Prince of Wales leaves for India at the end of October.

Smyrna, July 2nd.—Several soldiers and civilians were killed and a large number wounded when a great benzine supply depot and a large amount of ammunition blew up and burnt here yesterday. Several houses were destroyed by fire which followed the explosion.

Berlin, July 2nd.—General Nollet, President of the Allied disarmament commission, was officially informed yesterday by the German Foreign Office that the disarmament and disbandment of the Bavarian self-defence organizations has been completed. Germany has, according to the Govt. statement fulfilled the obligations imposed by the peace treaty, provided in the Allied ultimatum which called for a complete disarmament and disbandment by July 1st. The German disarmament commission created to see that the treaty provisions were carried out, today eases to functions in the future severe penalties are provided by the law of 1919, which though tem-

porarily suspended, again will be brought into play, and all persons found possessing arms will be imprisoned and heavily fined. Officials declined to state whether they regard disarmament as a fait accompli, but insisted they will spare no effort to make it so. They plan to comb Bavaria and other districts for arms that might not have been included in the lot surrendered and see that all those in Govt hands are destroyed as the treaty provides.

Leeds, July 4th.—The third test match started here on Saturday. First innings Australia all out 417, England 156 for five wickets at lunch hour today.

New York, July 4th.—The terrific heat, coupled with oppressive humidity yesterday, caused several heat prostrations and drove the greater part of the city's population to the beaches. The weather bureau reported a temperature of 91 degrees, which continued from afternoon until 6 o' clock, while the humidity hovered between 50 and 55. Police estimates placed the attendance of the three Long Island beaches at nearly one million. At Coney Island after every available water front bath house was filled, the crowd stormed the pools, until the police were called out to restore order. It was estimated that one hundred thousand of the four hundred thousand visitors went into the ocean. The police reported 106 lost children during the afternoon.
