ST. CROIX STATION.

Havana, April 11th.—The suspension of payments by the Banco Nacional de Cuba on Saturday apparently has not created much of a flurry in Cuba, as it was not altogether unexpected. Efforts are expected to commence immediately to recognize the bank on a sound financial basis. No statement of the actual financial status of the bank has yet been given out. While the low price of sugar continues adversely to affect conditions generally in Cuba and the situation is made worse through the practical paralysis of the tobacco industry, through foreign countries having placed heavy tariff duties on cigars and tobacco, no real uneasiness seems evident here, as regards the country's financial future.

London, April 11th. Mr. Massey, Prime Minister of New Zealand, will leave on Saturday for London to attend the Imperial Conference, according to a cable received here. Mr. Massey will cross Canada on his way here. The "Times" this morning alludes editorially to the Conference of the Dominion Premier and Imperial authorities to be held in London in June and endeavours to allay the suspicions which it thinks exist in the Dominions that Mr. Churchill the Colonial Secretary, intends to spring some new schemes of Imperial reorganization upon the gathering. Mr. Churchill, who has just returned from Egypt and Palestine, is the paper says more absorbed in Mesopotamian affairs than in schemes affecting the Dominions. In view, however, of what is being said in some quarters, relating to Mr. Churchill's grandiose ambition to reconstruct the Empire, in a hurry during June, the "Times" urges him to take the earliest opportunity to restore confidence in the Colonial Office and correct the widespread misapprehension, about the work which is likely to be undertaken

at the June meeting of the Imperial Conference.

New York, April 11th. The first Submarine Telephonic Cable to link the United States with Cuba will be formally opened tonight, when Mr. Harding talks from Washington to President Menocal in Havana. The new cable system has been installed by the Cuban American Telephone and Telegraph Co., to connect the systems of the Cuban Telephone Co. and the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. The completion of this system designed and laid under the direction of the experts of the Bell System marks an important advance in the Submarine Telephone.

London April 11th.—Sir Robert Sterne announced in the House of Commons the resumption of the issue of treasury bills by the tender of such bills on April 21st, limited to 50,000 pounds sterling for each tender. This is a departure from the practice prevailing since the Armistice, when the treasury issued bills at a full price. In market circles the opinion was expressed today, that Sir Robert announcement indicated the possibility of easier money conditions in the near future.
