TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Sept. 24th.—In the matter of unemployment in England, apart from the consideration of the question of giving immediate relief to the unemployed, it is understood that Gov-

ernment is studying the problem in a broader light and framing a new policy with a view to averting a heavy drain on the national resources for helping the workless in the event of trade and industrial operations not immediately reviving. It is stated that the plan will take the form of actual financial assistance to promote such trade revival. The scheme is not yet complete, but the Premier proposes to interview leading commercial and financial interests on his return to London, with the idea of producing a cooperative scheme. It is not unlikely that bankers will be asked to give more generous support to industry by means of treasury guarantees against, or participation in losses. In some quarters it is stated that the policy of the "Big Five" banking amalgamations in Great Britain has been under review at Gairloch, where the Cabinet has been holding sessions. Some of the Ministers of the Lloyd George administration severely criticized that policy as over cautious, it is said.

Gairloch, Scotland, Sept. 24th.—Viscount Fitzalan, Mr. Winston Churchill, and Mr. Edwin Montagu, who have been here with Mr. Lloyd George, left here today. Mr. Churchill proceeding to Dundee, where he is expected to make an important speech on Saturday. The departure of Viscount Fitzalan is taken here to indicate that the British reply to the latest telegram from Mr. De Valera may have been decided upon and one report says it is to be dispatched tonight.

London, Sept. 25th.—Professor Henry Jackson, one of the best known educators in the British Isles, died today at Bournemouth. He was well known as a writer on ancient Greece.

Mayence, Sept. 24th.—More than five hundred dead have been recovered from the vast ruins of the Badische plant at Oppau, and it is considered certain that 300 persons still are missing. 2,000 wounded, 400 of them seriously, are scattered in temporary hospitals for miles around the scene of the explosion which on Wednesday made waste of the big plant. All the sentries of the French military post in the plant are missing, and it is believed that the entire post was obliterated by the explosion. Roughly estimated, the material damage exceeds 1,000,000,000 marks. Store fronts collapsed at Worms, about 12 miles distant, windows were smashed at Frankfurt, while from Heidelberg damage estimated at 750,000 marks is reported.

Dundee, Sept. 24th.—Mr. Churchill in his speech here today also said the Govt. is profoundly disappointed by Mr. De Valera's rejection of the offer of Dominion Home Rule.
