that she could not hope for better deliveries as the workers and employers refused to work, "at the point of the bayonet for the benefit of the oppressor". He counselled his hearers to have nothing to do with civil war and announced that the Government would suppress with the strongest hand any civil disorder or rioting. He pleaded for open discussion as a means of saving the nation and said that he himself was ready to resign when it was felt the people had lost confidence in him. At the opening of the sitting, President Loebe paid tribute to the late President Harding, the members and the occupants of the public galleries standing during Herr Loebe's address.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 9th.—The R. M. S. freighter "Teviot" which is to replace the "Caracot", lost some weeks ago on the reefs off Bermuda, is now enroute to Halifax. The "Teviot" carries no passengers and she will sail from this port on August 17th for Bermuda and points south.

Berlin, Aug. 8th.—Dr. Johannes Barker, Minister of Economics, is reported by the "Vossische Zeitung" as saying that the Government does not intend to abandon paper mark currency as was rumoured yesterday. Dr. Barker added that the Government is resolved to do everything possible to support the mark and that it will not cancel measures already taken toward this end.

Cowes, Isles of White, Aug. 8th.—The series of races between the British and United States six metre yachts for the British-American Cup were postponed because of the death of President Harding, but will be resumed on August 11th and 13th at Cowes and on August 14th at Ryde.

Cowes, Aug. 8th.—The second day's racing of the Royal Yacht Squadron was carried out in light weather with several shifts in the wind which necessitated considerable manoeuvring. Eleven events were on the programme, the chief of these being a handicap race for yachts exceeding 100 tons. King George's "Britannia" was the scratch boat, but the weather conditions were not suited to her and she was led home by Mrs. F. Workman's "Nyria", to which "Britannia" conceded 7 minutes. "Britannia" finished second, but was disqualified, the second prize going to Colonel J. Gretton's ketch "Cariad". H. H. Preston's "Paula 3rd" was an easy winner in the class for vessels under 100 tons. J. S. Highfield's "Dorina" formerly the "Tuiga", was second, "Moonbeam" winner of the King's Cup was third. Frederick Last's "Noreen" won the 12 metre class race by five seconds from Mr. O'Connor's "Kelpie", Mr. Payne's new boat "Vanity" being third. "Jean" captured the six metre class race with "Capelle" second and "L. G." third.

Berlin, Aug. 8th.—At the opening of the short extraordinary session of the Reichstag today, to dispose of urgent financial measures, Chancellor Cuno made a long speech reviewing the internal and external situations, and alluding to the British draft reply of the German note, to say that the principles upon which Great Britain placed her proposals were not pleasant for Germany. There were many suggestions in the draft which appeared impossible to the German Government, so far as it was able to judge without knowledge of the supplementary documents, asserted the Chancellor, adding, that in an endeavour to maintain good relations with her "comrade in arms of yesterday", Great Britain had gone extraordinarily far in her concessions to the French standpoint.

Dublin, Aug. 9th.—At the adjournment of the Dail yesterday President Cosgrave announced that the Dail would be dissolved today. He added that nominations for the new Dail would be made August 18th, that the elections would be held August 27th, and that the new Parliament would assemble on September 9th.

New York, Aug. 9th.—Germany's determination to continue passive resistance in the Ruhr coupled with the opening of railroad brotherhood conferences expected to lead to demands for higher wages, had a depressing influence on prices at the opening of today's Stock market.

London, Aug. 10th.—The match between the West Indian touring cricketers and Somerset was continued yesterday at Weston-Super-Mare. The Somerset XI completed their first innings for a score of 112. The West Indians then went in to their second innings, scoring 134. Time did not permit the home-stayers to complete their second innings, and at the close of the day's play they had scored 15 for the loss of two wickets with the visitors leading by 313. Paris, Aug. 9th.—A naval demonstration in Chinese waters by the European powers, it is learned today, is under consideration, owing to anarchical conditions in the Chinese navy. The department of marine is preparing to send two cruisers one of them being the armoured cruiser "Jetis Ferry", if the demonstration is decided upon.
