London, Aug. 9th.—The West Indian touring XI yesterday played their 22nd match against Somerset at Weston-Super-Mare. Batting first the West Indians amassed the valuable score of 306 runs. Following are the individual scores: West Indian XI. Challenger 79, Tarilton 3, Ince 23, Austin 76, Small 12, Holt 56, Browne 15, Constantine 6, Pascall 2, Francis 2, Dewhurst not out 3, extras 29, total 306. The homesters now went to the wicket and at call of time had only mustered 21 runs for the loss of 3 wickets. Somerset XI. MacBryan 4, Daniell 9, Lyon 8, Young not out 0, total for 3 wickets 21. The match will be continued today.

New York, Aug. 7th.—The early raw sugar market was firmer and prices were 1/4 cents higher, with Cuba's quote 1 at 4 1/2 cents, cost and freight, equal to 6 1/5 for centrifugal. Sales reported were 17,500 bags of Cuba's to a local refiner for August shipment. Porto Rico's were offered at the same basis. The raw sugar futures market was firmer on covering and scattered commission house buying, prompt-

ed by the advance in the spot market. After showing advances of five to eight points, prices reacted under realizing and at midday were unchanged to three points net higher. There were no changes in refined sugar and the demand was still light. Prices were quoted at 7.90 to 8.00 for fine granulated. Refined futures were nominal.

Berlin, Aug. 8th.—Utter confusion prevailed in the retail situation in greater Berlin today, due to the continued plunging of the mark and the consequent fantastic rise of the dollar. While the food situation continues to show a chronic shortage in ordinary staples, hourly rises of prices, caused by the fluctuation of the mark, are projecting a new and serious element into the situation as the retailers are withdrawing their wares from sale whenever the customers refuse to pay prices based on the gold mark, or the dollar units. As the latter procedure results in price ranges which are prohibited under the usuary ordinances, the shopkeepers union has proclaimed a general strike for Thursday and all retail establishments, except food shops, will close down for the day, as a protest against conditions under which they are expected to operate.

Washington, August 7th.—Contracts

have been made by German grain exporters for 12,795,000 bushels of rye from Russia for the coming year according to cable advices to the Department of Agriculture, part payment to be made in goods.

Montreal, Aug. 7th.—The Oxford-Cambridge lacrosse team, on tour in this country, played its second game of the tour and was defeated here yesterday by a National Amateur Association team by the score of 10 to 4.

Montreal, Aug. 7th.—The liner "Doric", which will arrive in this port this weekend, is bringing approximately nine hundred British harvesters who are travelling west under the cheap passage scheme for harvest labourers. Two other vessels the "Cassandra" and the "Melita" are bringing similar passengers. The "Doric" is also conveying the crew of the Leander Rowing Club, coming to compete in the regatta at Toronto in connection with the Canadian National Exhibition.

Ottawa, Aug. 7th.—The total number of immigrants to enter Canada during the month of July was about 16,000. Exact figures are not yet available, reports from few of the ports not yet having reached the Department of Immigration here, but the above total is approximately correct. Immigration from the United States was about normal, while there was an increase in the number of immigrants coming from the British Isles. The closing of a large employment agency at Detroit is regarded as having the effect of turning a large number of Canadians, who had gone to that city, back to Canada, it is stated.

Dover, Aug. 7th.—The Daily Sketch announced today that it has decided to award to Henry Sullivan the 1,000 pound prize it offered some time ago for the Channel swim. The newspaper says that although Sullivan entered the contest, he did not fulfil the conditions, inasmuch as there was no representative of the paper in the accompanying boat, but that in view of his pluck and the fact that there is no doubt of his having accomplished the feat, the prize will be awarded.

Berlin, Aug. 8th.—A sensational attempt to discredit the Cuno Government was made yesterday when a fake newspaper appeared on the streets, in the heart of Berlin, announcing that the Cuno Government had been overthrown. Copies were thrown from automobiles and sold by hawkers while excited crowds fought for them, and the news flashed through the city spreading confusion. The Government hurriedly denied the report, announcing that it would punish those responsible. The act is laid to political enemies of Chancellor Cuno.

Berlin, Aug. 9th.—All the shops in Berlin, with the exception of the provision stores, closed today as a protest against the refusal of the authorities to allow prices to be fixed on a gold basis.
