EDITORIAL.

Capt. R. D. Lowell, late commanding

officer, U. S. M. C., at this port, gained much public respect during his tenure of office here. He maintained order and displayed the capability of his predecessor in discharging the duties of his important, and doubtless onerous calling, and we regret to lose him. Capt. Lowell is succeeded by Capt. Noble whom we welcome with all good wishes.

Mr. P. Adamsen, one of the directors of the West Indian Sugar Factory, Bethlehem, is going away. The popular feeling is that this island can hardly afford to lose the many valuable people which seems to be our lot of late, and it is hoped that Mr. Adamsen will return. This gentleman fills an important post and has intimate connections with the island's general welfare by reason of the fact that his concern employs the largest number of people in St. Croix, thereby making its interests the interests of every second man, woman and child, and it is to his credit that he has ever shown a humanitarian spirit in dealing with the people. Personally Mr. Adamsen is one of most unassuming men one can expect to meet, a perfect gentleman as humble as a child at all times, and never seeming to feel the slightest ostentation because of his situation, attributes which disclose the true gentleman, and have endeared him to the people of this island. We trust the change will prove beneficial to Mr. and Mrs. Adamsen, and that they will always remember St. Croix where a warm welcome awaits them. Mr. Adamsen is succeeded by Director Wulff.

It is being talked about that a movement is on foot to have the Colonial Council take action with regard to preventing importation by individuals who buy from mail order houses through the mails. In other words our generous mercantile fraternity, for it is understood to emanate there, would like to restrict how the people shall spend their money and where they shall spend it. The hard working laborer, the underpaid clerk, the seller in the stores and everybody else must be legislated for as to where they shall place their meagre means to get the best returns. The whole thing savors of Russia, or Turkey, and probably the parties back of this have been indulging in too much of the history of these savage European countries. Of course it is perfectly absurd and preposterous for anyone to imagine that the individual right to buy things through the mails can be restricted. What can be restricted, controlled and stopped is illegal retailing of imported or even locally bought goods. To restrict purchasing by mail would necessitate a law passed in the States to prevent the mail order houses selling to these islands, the mere thought of which is too very crazy to be entertained; also a revision of the postal regulations to prohibit the use of the parcel post mails
