While reading your paper of yesterday's date, I came across a correspondence written by Mr. Joseph Thomas, Capt. of the Neptune Cricket Club, making some most ignorant statements about the result of the match played on Monday last on the Holger Danske Ground between his Club and the Christiansted Cricket Club.

Now concerning the decision made by the two Captains that these two men from the Invincible will play until the other two men that was to play turned up then went ahead playing, any how one did,

and when he asked for his game it was decided by the said Captain of the N. C. C. that he will play with the same men that he started to play with, so what blind excuses he is making now.

In the first innings the N. C. C. went to bat first and they scored 100 runs, while the C. C. C. only scored 98, and the two men that he is speaking about also played in the first innings, that did satisfy him, when his club won by two runs, in the first innings but in the second innings they scored 17 runs while the two men that he is speaking about went to the wickets first and scored 27 runs not out, leaving ten more wickets to fall, and from the time that happened he along with his men got disgusted and stopped the game, and he started to argue, so the public in general will see that he is to be faulted.

Concerning the decision between himself and the Capt. of the C. C. C. that they made a few days before the match, I know nothing about that, but I am basing on what I heard for myself on that day, so if the Captain of the C. C. C. can't defend himself in the papers as a man he ought to be fired from being Captain of said Club and I hope the next time he will understand himself what he is about to do.

As I don't want to have no argument with any one concerning Cricket, I consider the matter closed, but before, doing so, I will ask the Hon. Capt. of the C. C. C. to play the N. C. C. the return match as soon as possible with his own men, so if your Club gains the victory over them he won't have no rubbish to talk about. I am finish, quite finish, and if this is to be answered again by the Captain of the N. C. C. I will leave him to fight with the dogs running along on the public streets.

TELEGRAMS.**ST. CROIX STATION.**

St. Lucia, Sept. 4th.—The Hon. James Stanley, the newly appointed Attorney-General, arrived and assumed duties.

New York, Sept. 3rd.—Financial and commercial interests with important connections in Brazil were without advices today regarding the latest conditions in that country. Little surprise was expressed, however, at report of further unsettlement there, exchange rates having moved steadily against Brazil in the market for a long time.

London, Sept. 3rd.—Financial circles have received a report that a powerful group of American Bankers, headed by J. P. Morgan, has concluded arrangement with the French Minister of Finance that half of France's share of the loan by the United States is to be liqui-

dated by a new loan. To facilitate negotiation, it is said, France will shortly ship to the United States 200,000 francs in gold.

Constantinople, Sept. 3rd.—Mustapha Kemal Pasha, leader of the Turkish Nationalist forces, is reported to be feeling that his efforts to hold out until the November rains block the roads and give him respite during the winter are becoming impossible. He is said to have lost hope of receiving immediate Bolshevik aid and lacks artillery with which to fight the Greeks, his troops being dispirited. It is anticipated here that he will flee rather than surrender. At the same time it is forecasted that the new cabinet to be named here will lean towards the Nationalists so that the Sultan's Govt. may be accepted throughout Turkey. The Nationalists are going on to this end.

Montreal, Sept. 4th.—"Enviably is that teacher in Jewish life who serves in any pulpit under the British flag", said Rev. Dr. Wise, Rabbi of the Free Synagogue, New York, in his address at the temple Emanuel here at the introduction of Rabbi Merritt, as pastor of the synagogue. He added that the British flag had been a loved symbol of the Jewish people for centuries.

Belfast, Sept. 4th.—The Thermasen coast guard station near Waterford was blown up yesterday by a party of armed and masked men. Before destroying the station the raiders disarmed the two men in charge. Large quantities of arms have been seized by raiders at various points in the region of Waterford. A motorcar in which Mr. McConville was carrying 1,300 pounds to pay the wages of factory workers was held up by armed men near Banbridge yesterday. The assailants took the money from him and threw him down an embankment. They shot and killed the driver of the car and escaped with their booty.

London, Sept. 4th.—Great Britain is well on her way to re-gain the commercial positions which she held before the war says the Official Summary issued by the American Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber bases its opinion on the July returns received by the Board of Trade which makes the best showing since the war, Great Britain's adverse trade balance being reduced to 8,000,000 pounds, says the Chamber statements. Some industries are facing a slump and unemployment was rising slightly at the end of July. It adds, however, that the depression is thought to be only temporary as the world is still badly in need of goods and the re-adjustment of prices will increase the demands. Among the unfavourable factors mentioned apart from the threatened miners' strike is the decrease in many lines of export to the United States by which sterling exchange is kept down. Moreover the rise on cost of living has continued notably as regards bread,
