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to refer the question of the Aland Islands to a committee of international jurists who will be nominated by the President of the League. The Swedish and Finnish Govts. have agreed to abstain from any action likely to aggravate the situation pending the decision of the jurists.

London July 13th.—The protest over the treatment of General Dyer is gathering force in the press, and Lord Finlay is moving in the House of Lords a resolution deploring the conductance of General Dyer's case as unjust and dangerous. The Morning Post "General Dyer Fund" has brought in £6,000 in four days. General Dyer was dismissed from the army following an inquiry into the shooting down of a number of natives at Amritsar, India, during riots, on the General's instructions.

Paris, July 13th.—The victories of the Greeks, their occupation of Brussa, and the demoralization of the Turkish Nationalists have caused a great reaction in Turkish circles, which now show an inclination to accept and sign the peace treaty, according to despatches from Constantinople today.

London, July 13th. The death is reported of Captain Sylvester who commanded the hospital ship Landoverly Castle when she was submarined with Canadian medical officers and nurses on board.

Spa, July 13th.—A deadlock has been reached by the Allied representatives and the Germans on the coal question, and Marshal Foch and Field Marshal Wilson, the Allied Military Chiefs, have again been summoned to discuss possible enforcement measures. The Allied Premiers having been informed that the Germans were ready, called a meeting for 5.30 o'clock this evening instead of tomorrow as planned this morning. The German reply was not considered favourable, and the summoning of Marshal Foch and Field Marshal Wilson, it is understood, means immediate measures to enforce the treaty, unless Germany modifies her attitude. The German Foreign Minister said to the Associated Press, "The Allies may, under the treaty, give us an order concerning coal. If they give an order, we, of course, would try to satisfy, but we do not believe we could. That would not be a voluntary cooperative arrangement, Dr. Simmons said later: "The Allies can occupy the Ruhr or other territories. They can send their own agents into Germany and probe the situation. They may fix any penalties, we are not in position to resist." The Secretary expressed the attitude of the Allied ministers, and hoped that before they take further measures, that the Germans may change their decision. Marshal Foch will leave Paris tonight, arriving at Spa tomorrow morning, Field Marshal Wilson

is scarcely expected to report here before tomorrow afternoon or evening. The Supreme Council will meet immediately after their arrival, the German delegation remaining meanwhile. Dr. Simmons said late tonight that the Germans had nothing to add to their coal proposition. He regretted exceedingly the position taken by the Allies and said that the Germans must simply await further action. M. Millerand regrets that it is impossible for Germany to cooperate with the Allies in the execution of the treaty, but he is firmly resolved to stand on the position now taken up. Mr. Lloyd George had no comment to make. He considers the action of the Supreme Council speaks for itself. In well informed circles it is the opinion that if enforcement is undertaken, the Ruhr will be surrounded rather than occupied.
