TELEGRAM.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Feb. 24th.—The raw sugar market was steady early today. Considerable business was said to have been put through by the Cuban Committee to Canadian and local refiners for February and March, shipments at 4½ cents, cost and freight, equal to 5.77 for centrifugals. In refined, prices were changed to 25 points higher, with fine granulated listed at 7.25. Futures were quiet on light covering. Prices were 5 to 7 points higher at midday.

London, Feb. 24th.—Rechad Pasha, a delegate of the Constantinople Govt. to the Near East conference here, speaking in the name of both his group and that of the Nationalists, told the Allied conference at today's session, that both factions of the Turks would accept the decisions of the allies. The attitude of the Turks made an excellent impression upon the conference. M. Briand declared after sitting, that the conference had gone a long way toward a settlement.

London, Feb. 24th.—Under the caption "shamming dead", the "Daily Mail" yesterday began a series of articles based on inquiries by a number of special investigators extending over some months, purporting to show that Germany intends to evade the reparations by trickery. The "Mail" declares that the German industrial machine is being deliberately kept at low speed for the purpose of impressing the world with the precariousness of its financial situation, and asserts that German industries have progressed immensely, thanks to the cheap wages and long hours.

New York Feb. 24th.—Mr. Hoover telephoned Senator Harding tonight that he had accepted the offer of the cabi-

net post of Secretary of Commerce, Mr. Baker, his assistant, announced tonight.

London, Feb. 24th.—In the House of Commons tonight during the debate on the unemployment insurance bill, the Government, in response to urgent representation by the Labourites, agreed to increase the insurance benefit to 20 shillings for men and 16 shillings for women.

FROM THE POLICE.

THE attention of all owners of automobiles, motor trucks, etc. is invited to the following "Supplement to the Police Regulations for St. Croix of 24th February 1915" which will be strictly enforced by the Police on and after March 1st 1921.

the Police, and no automobile must be used upon public roads without being

The signboards mentioned in Paragraph 1 of the said regulations must not be smaller than 6 inches broad by 9 inches long and the letter and number be painted in black upon a white background.

"SUPPLEMENT TO THE POLICE REGULATIONS FOR ST. CROIX OF 24TH FEBRUARY 1915."

For all automobiles a distinguishing letter and number shall be prescribed by provided with two sign boards, one in front, and one at the back of the car, containing these distinguishing signs, easy to be read at a distance of 75 feet.

When in use between sunset and sunrise, the automobiles must be provided with a lighted lantern, which clearly illuminates the hind signboard," etc., etc.
