### TELEGRAMS.

#### ST. CROIX STATION.

London, May 26th.—Events points to  
a Chinese revolution, the London Daily  
Mail correspondent in Peking wires. It  
is believed the army has consented to  
join a movement to restore the boy Em-  
peror. The situation was brought about  
by the political turmoil arising after the  
capture of foreigners and Chinese by  
Shantung bandits.

London, May 26th.—While all the Lon-  
don papers maintain silence this morning  
regarding Mr. Bonar Law's condition,  
reliable authorities maintain he is seri-  
ously ill. It is stated that his condition  
is unimproved. A primary operation  
merely divulged the nature of the trou-  
ble. A major operation yesterday show-  
ed the seriousness of the fundamental  
trouble. A grave view is taken in cer-  
tain quarters.

London, May 28th.—The third cricket  
match of the tour was played by the  
West Indian XI on Saturday against the  
Marylebone Cricket Club at Lords. The  
M. C. C. went in to bat first, scoring 228.  
Bowling for the West Indians, John took  
two wickets for 53 runs, Pascall six for  
77, Holt one for 22. The West Indians  
going in to bat compiled 105 for eight  
wickets when stumps were drawn. The  
scores were. Nunes 11, Tarilton 0,  
Challenger 5, Holt, 23, Ince 1, Small (not  
out) 30, Browne 4, Constantine 4, Dew-  
hurst 5, Pascall (not out) 1, extras 21,  
total 105. John for the West Indians  
has still to bat. The bowling and field-  
ing of the touring XI was excellent  
throughout.

London, May 28th.—The match against  
the M. C. C. was stopped after ten min-  
utes play by rain. The West Indians  
made 121 runs for eight wickets. Small  
39 not out and Pascall not out 8.

New York, May 26th.—The raw sugar  
market was firm and prices were un-  
changed at 6 1/2 cents for Cubas, cost

and freight, equal to 8.28 for centrifugal.  
Business was less active, the only sales  
reported being a total of 5,000 bags for  
second half June shipment to an opera-  
tor. The continued warm weather was  
looked upon as favourable for an increas-  
ed consumption of sugar and led to re-  
newed buying by both trade interests  
and commission houses in the raw sugar  
futures market today, with closing prices  
at about the best of the day and from  
three to eight points higher. Closing  
July 5.55 September 6.64 December 6.09.  
In refined futures there was a sale of  
one lot for August delivery at 9.95.

London, May 26th.—All the prominent  
candidates for the Derby, which will  
be run at Epsom on June 6th, are  
going in fine style with Town Guard  
still established as the favourite. The  
favourite showed up well in a gal-  
lop with Knockando in the last week.  
Ellangowan made a satisfactory show-  
ing in a recent gallop and yesterday  
Papyrus and Lord Derby's pair Pharos  
and Tranquil all made a good impression.  
The following is the latest London bet-  
ting: 95 to 25 against Town Guard. 10  
to 1 against Papyrus Ellangowan and  
Pharos, 15 to 1 against Legality, 20 to 1  
against, My Lord, all taken and offered.  
20 to 1 against Roger De Busli offered  
22 to 1 against twelve Pointer and Light  
Hand. 33 to 1 against Tranquil.

Dortmund, May 27th.—Chaos is inevi-  
table in the Ruhr unless intervention  
comes immediately, says a telegraphic ap-  
peal sent to the new socialist workers in-  
ternationale at Hamburg by the Dort-  
mund general trade union.

Berlin, May 27th.—A French court  
martial at Wenden has sentenced Schoen  
Landrat of the Essen district, to five  
years imprisonment and a fine of ten mil-  
lion marks for writing an insulting letter  
to General Degoutte.

Essen, May 27th.—The French author-  
ities have seized ninety billion marks  
from the Reichsbank here. They took  
this action because they needed money  
to pay certain bills and the Germans re-  
fused to furnish it, declaring there was  
not so much money on hand.

Allahabad, B I May 27th.—A despatch  
to the Pioneer from Meshed, Persia re-  
ports a severe earthquake at Turbat-i-  
haidari with loss of life and damage to  
property.

Canton, May 27th.—A lighter with a  
full cargo of kerosene oil owned by the  
Texas Oil Company, was seized by Chi-  
nese pirates here today. An armed party  
from U. S. S. Helena has been des-  
patched in pursuit.

London, May 27th.—In a letter to his  
constituents Mr. Austen Chamberlain  
complains that no opportunity was given  
to him or his colleagues in the late  
Government to make a contribution to  
conservative party unity. No commu-  
nication from Mr. Stanley Baldwin was  
made to him before he formed his minist-
