ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin May 21st. According to a despatch from Moscow, Leonid Krassin the Bolshevik representative in London, has been appointed Ambassador of the Soviet Government to Germany.

Genoa, May 21st. In the course of the Economic Conference negotiations were commenced for the conclusion of an Anglo Italian treaty of commerce and it is believed that as soon as the Italian Parliament had adjourned Signor Schanzer, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, will proceed to London to conclude the negotiations.

Strasbourg, May 21st. Speaking at a congress of the National Association of veterans, in which representatives of British and American Associations and other veterans participated, M. Poincare denounced the insidious propaganda of the Pan-Germans in Alsace and abroad to separate Alsace Lorraine from France. The President of the Council said. "We wish to have peace in our hearts, but we are too near the frontier to cherish any illusions. Alsace will never believe that fable of German disarmament and divines clearly what is hidden behind the police organizations and knows too well that stores of arms are discovered daily in Germany. She cannot believe in the moral disarmament of Germany and is too well-informed of the secret thoughts of our neighbours of which she observes many manifestations. Do we not see in many countries, notably in America, a German campaign in favour of the autonomy and neutrality of Alsace-Lorraine? nevertheless, before and during the war Germany refused to discuss

in any form whatever the question of their independence and each time the inhabitants were consulted they indicated their desire to return to France. Conquered Germany has promised reparations and you who have been the witnesses of the ravages of her arms, will not suffer her to evade her promises."

London, May 22nd.—The Govt. has invited the Irish signatories to the Anglo-Irish treaty to come to London to discuss with the British signatories the agreement signed on Saturday between the representatives of the provisional Govt. and the followers of Mr. De Valera.

Genoa, May 22nd.—M. Tchitcherin, head of the Russian Soviet delegation, in bidding farewell to Premier Facta and Foreign Minister Schanzer, who were returning to Rome, said yesterday that he was glad to be able to state that the reception by the Italian Govt. and the full services rendered "have surpassed our most optimistic hopes and been a revelation to us". Continuing he said that the economic forces, which regulate world relations, have contributed to bring about a close union between the Russian and Italian peoples.

Genoa, May 22nd. The declaration by M. Tchitcherin to the Italian delegation

is contrasted here with the news received from the Black Sea, according to which the Italian steamer "Marina" was fired on and sunk by Russian batteries, half her crew being killed, and also with an address by Trozky to the Communist cadets, when he is reported to have said to the future Red officers "Don't believe in the Genoa speeches, trust only in your bayonets and batteries. Conferences will not give us what we need. This can only be obtained by having the Red army cross the frontiers of the Capitalistic states and have the Red flag wave over the whole of Europe. Perhaps during the summer the Red army may be called upon to give proof of its fighting force".

Washington, May 22nd. The participation by the United States in economic councils abroad, when the Governments of Europe are ready to eliminate political questions from discussions concerning world rehabilitation, was forecasted last night in official circles.

Brussels, May 22nd.—Mlle Suzanne Lenglen yesterday successfully defended her title to the international hard-court tennis championship, defeating Miss Elizabeth Ryan, of California, in two straight sets by six to three and six to two.
