TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION

London, Sept. 30th. — Sugar in stock on the 27th instant was 125,000 tons. Last year 262,000 tons.

St. Thomas, October 2nd. — Censor restrictions withdrawn on cable messages to and from France.

London, October 1st. — At the meeting of the transport men today it was arranged that eleven Delegates from the Transport Workers Conference would meet the Premier at three o'clock.

London, October 1st. — Captain O'Grady a Labour Leader and Member of Parliament for East Leeds, on entering the Conference of the Transport Workers Federation this afternoon, said "something very important will happen. I hope this Conference will succeed in effecting a settlement". Mr. Smillie, leader of the miners, and one of the sponsors of the movement, demanding direct action in the recent Labour Congress at Glasgow, pledged this morning that fifty per cent of the manual workers of the country would be idle within a week. He declared he expected the miners' steel works, shipyards and all factories to shut down.

London, Oct. 1st. — Throughout Great Britain the various local schemes of food distribution are working admirably but the railway strike has almost completely paralyzed industry, and from every centre come reports of works closing down through lack of transport facilities and coal. More than 150,000 north England miners are idle, their number being added to daily. In Manchester which reflects the views of the textile industry grave fears are expressed that unless a settlement is reached before the end of the week, many thousands of cotton operatives will be thrown out of work and all business suspended, seven steel works in Sheffield have already closed down and others affecting 100,000 men can only hope to carry on until Sunday. Twenty thousand iron workers are idle in the Middlesborough district and the Leicestershire engineering works, and Burton which brews beer for all England has entirely stopped work through lack of casks.

London, Oct. 1st. — While the delegates of the Transport Federation were assembling today to decide whether the 325,000 workers they represented, should go out in sympathy with the striking railwaymen of Great Britain the Government's official report on the situation, issued at noon, announced a continued improvement in actual conditions. The train service had been bettered, the communique asserted, more than 800 trains having been run yesterday, inclusive of those in operation in the underground service. Additional railwaymen had returned to work, it was declared. Arrangements have been made to replace the busmen and the tramwaymen should they strike, the statement announced. It was added that the movement of food was proceeding remarkably well. The meeting of the transport federation marked the most critical movement so far in the labour situation, brought about by the railway tie up. The meeting was attended by representatives of other organizations invited by

the transport men. These included the amalgamated engineers federation, the shipbuilding and engineering trades, the printing trades, the electrical trades, the railway clerks, the new postal federation and the national federation of miners and workmen. Most of the Labour members of the House of Commons also were present. It was expected that the transport workers demand a general strike by all trades, but a considerable difference of opinion existed, some of the delegates being inclined to ask for a ballot of the members of the organization before reaching a decision. Mr. Thomas, the railwaymen's leader, on entering the meeting, said he was still using all his influence to confine the dispute to the original participants, the Govt. and the railwaymen.

London, Oct. 1st — Admiral Beatty speaking at Kirkcally said he had noticed that the railwaymen's leaders had congratulated the men on their loyalty to the Union. Admiral Beatty remarked that it seemed to him loyalty required a much broader interpretation.

London, Oct. 1st — The response to the Govt's appeal for volunteers continues astonishingly great. Members of the Cavalry Club, Royal Air Force Club, Colonels, Majors, Barristers, Accountants, Consulting Electrical, Mechanical and Civil Engineers, are to be found among the stokers at the underground powerhouses and undertaking traffic duties at stations, working lifts etc. The latest news from South Wales shows that most of the leading Welsh industries including coal mining and tin plate are working badly. The strike has affected at least 400,000 miners and 26,000 tinplate men, while work on the docks is at a standstill. Pickets near Cardiff last night captured a number of pilferers and handed them over to the police.

San Salvador, Oct. 1st. — An epidemic of yellow fever has terminated and no new cases have developed.

Paris, Oct. 1st. — Captain Mornet who was Government Prosecutor in the cases against Bolo Tasha, Pierre Lenoir, Charles Humbert and M. Duval, all of whom were tried for having communicated intelligence to the enemy, has been appointed in the same capacity at the trial of Joseph Caillaux, Ex-Premier.

Copenhagen, Oct. 1st. — The lines at Bulata are reported broken by the troops of the Finnish General Balakovich, in a despatch received here from Helsingfors. Whole divisions of the Bolsheviks are declared to have surrendered.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Oct. 1st. — Cincinnati today won the opening game of the world's series from Chicago Americans by a score of 9 to 1.

Washington, Oct. 1st. — Boris Bakhmeteff, the Russian Ambassador, informed the State Department today that General Razanoff, the Superior Russian Commander in Siberia, had apologized for an incident at Ima, Siberia, on Sept.
