TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, April 21st.—Fears were expressed tonight that there will be a prolongation of the stoppage of work at the mines. At the conclusion of the meeting of the miners executive today, Mr. Hodges said district reports all clearly indicate the men were standing firmly by the principles of a "National wages Board and a National wages pool". It is considered not unlikely that tomorrow's conference of miners delegates

will adjourn without reaching a decision. Meanwhile the Government appears to be standing aside until the parties to the dispute are able to agree on some basis for a conference.

London, April 21st.—The Govt. has withdrawn its ban on racing so far as the two thousand and one thousand guineas are concerned. Both races will be run on April 29th.

Washington April 21st.—The United States Govt. today refused an urgent request of the German Govt. that President Harding mediate the question of reparations between Germany and the Allies and fix the sum Germany is to pay. The United States agrees, however, that if the German Govt. would formulate promptly such proposals regarding reparations as would present a proper basis for discussion, it would consider bringing the matter to the attention of the allied govts, in a manner acceptable to them, in order that negotiations may speedily be resumed. Germany's appeal was answered by Mr. Hughes after a conference late today with the president. The text of both the appeal and reply, were made public tonight by the State Dept. In reply Mr. Hughes said:—"This Govt. could not agree to mediate the question of reparations with a view to acting as umpire in its settlement. Impressed, however, with the seriousness of the issues involved, as they affect the whole world, the Govt. of the United States feels itself to be deeply concerned with the question of obtaining an early and just solution. This Govt. strongly desires that there should be an immediate resumption of negotiations and reiterated its earnest hopes that the German Govt. will promptly formulate such proposals as would represent a proper basis for discussion. Should the German Govt. take this course, this Govt. will consider bringing the matter to the attention of the Allied Govts. in a manner acceptable to them, in order that negotiations may speedily be resumed.

London, April 21st.—The bye-election for the Bowdley division of Worcester resulted in a victory for the coalition unionist candidate over his independent labourite opponent by a majority of 12,857. The polling was as follows. Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin (coalition Unionist) 14,527. Mr. Mills, (independent labourite) 1880.

London, April 22nd.—British mine owners and leaders of the miners federation of Great Britain will meet Mr. Lloyd George this afternoon to discuss the coal crisis. The meeting will be held at the institution of Mr. Lloyd George. The conference of the Miners Federation which was to have been held today has been adjourned until tomorrow.
