TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Liverpool, Aug. 4th—The Government has informed the Cunard Company that prevailing conditions in Ireland may prejudice the ordinary safeguards for navigation, and that the Government considers it advisable, as a temporary precaution, for passenger ships from abroad to proceed to English ports without calling at Queenstown, and it requests the Cunard Line to act accordingly.

Paris, Aug. 4th.—In view of the Polish situation urgent telegrams were sent today to the Allied Ambassadors, including the United States Ambassador, asking them to return to Paris from their vacations for a meeting of the Ambassadorial Council to be held tomorrow. The business to be dealt with at this meeting will be the adoption of a reply to the German request for permission to send troops for defensive purposes in the Allenstein region.

London, Aug. 4th.—Poland and Ireland gave Mr. Lloyd George a busy time today. In addition to presiding at a long cabinet council and discussing these questions, the Premier received in the afternoon, and again in the evening, a deputation of Irish Unions and Nationalists from Dublin and Cork, who urged him to grant Dominion Home Rule for Ireland. The deputation was headed by Sir Stanley Harring, Commissioner of Education for Ireland, and included a number of prominent men, among the Professor Trench of Trinity College. With the Premier were Mr. Bonar Law, Sir Hamar Greenwood and other Ministers. An official report of the conference will be issued shortly. The conference was a private one, but at it occurred a discussion of the entire Irish question. Between the conference with the Irish men Mr. Lloyd George and Mr. Bonar Law received Mr. Kameneff, President of the Moscow Soviet, M. Krassin, the Soviet Minister of Trade and Commerce, and other members of the Russian Mission, who have come to London in an endeavor
