not wish to comment on Mr. Bonar Law's resignation at the moment. He added he would reserve any comment until Tuesday, when he will address his constituency. Mr. J. Ramsay MacDonald said "It comes as a great shock of surprise to me. The first thought one has is purely personal sorrow for the serious condition of Mr. Bonar Law's health. I find it difficult to express the deep regret I feel that he should be incapacitated after so short a tenure of office. All Mr. Bonar Law's colleagues in the House, irrespective of party, will continue to hope that rest from his heavy work may mean that he will be able for years yet to take an interest in our doings. In these latter months I had come to regard him with real affection. It would be improper in such circumstances to speculate on the political aspect". Field Marshal Earl Haig, who was attending a dinner of the British Legion when he learned of the Prime Minister's resignation, said, "I am greatly grieved. Mr. Bonar Law was a great statesman, he did splendid work during the war. He is a fine broad minded, honest, gentleman and a good Scotsman and all my sympathy goes out to him". It was stated late this evening that Mr. Bonar Law's condition was slightly improved after his rest following upon the journey from Paris.

Ottawa, May 20th.—Informed by the Canadian press tonight of the resignation of Mr. Bonar Law as Prime Minister of Great Britain, on account of ill health, Premier McKenzie King issued the following statement to the Press. "The sympathy of all parts of the British Empire will be extended to Mr. Bonar Law in the circumstances which have occasioned his resignation as Prime Minister of Great Britain. Regardless altogether of their political affiliations the people of Canada will experience a profound regret that one whose great work they justly appreciated and whose

name they are proud to associate with the Dominion, has been obliged through the impairment of his health to relinquish the highest post in the gift of the British nation and this at the moment of largest opportunity. We join with the British peoples everywhere in the sincere hope that freedom from the responsibilities and cares of office may not be without its beneficent effects upon Mr. Law's health.

St. Andrews, May 20th.—From the limb of the lost, eight golfers from the United States fought their way upward to a gallant victory over the best amateurs of Great Britain on Sunday afternoon and retained for the United States possession of the Walker Cup emblem of team supremacy in the realm of golf. This ancient seat of the game has seldom been the scene of as thrilling a competition. Friday night the United States teams had one victory to 3 defeats in the foursomes. At noon Saturday the United States were down in five of the eight singles and the other was square. Then with 18 holes to go in all these eight matches and the British needing only 4 to gain the cup, the United States came home with five victories, one abandoned, two defeats. Thus they kept the cup by a score of 6½ matches to 5½. Four of the eight games were decided only when the ball had dropped in the cup on the 36th green and the fate of the entire competition was unknown until the last of the eight contests had been played to the 36th hole.

New York, May 20th.—All foreign owned steamship lines are expected to follow the lead of the Cunard Line in their deciding to refrain from bringing liquor inside the three mile limit in defiance of the Supreme Court ruling. The Cunard Line has announced that after June 10th no liquor will be carried inside United States territorial waters. This means that if any is left when the three

mile zone is reached, it will be thrown overboard. On the westward trip the ships will be bone dry, except those which call at Halifax. The latter will take on liquor supplies there.

Louisville, Ky., May 20th.—Zev, owned by Mr. Sinclair, yesterday, won the forty-ninth Kentucky Derby, before a crowd of 75,000 persons, the greatest throng that ever witnessed a horse race in the United States. Starting from tenth position from the inner rail, Zev shot into the lead a few feet after leaving the barrier and led the field until the fall of the flag, crossing the wire a length and a half ahead of Martingale, owned by J. N. Cosdon. Walter L. Salmons Vigil, winner of the Preakness stakes, finished third. The race at one and a quarter miles was run over a track lightning fast, the time being 2.055, two seconds lower than the record for the event set by Old Rose Bud in 1914. The race was worth \$52,625 net to Mr. Sinclair. Martingale's owner received \$6,000 as second money, while \$3,000 went to Vigil for third place and \$1,300 to Nassau for fourth. A \$2 ticket in the Pari Mutuel paid \$30.40 on Zev's victory.

Plymouth, May 20th.—A robbery among the mails brought from New York on the liner "Minnekahda" was reported when the steamer arrived yesterday. It was stated that fifteen bags were missing, including some containing registered letters.

Peking May 21st.—Reports that troops were firing on the Shantung bandits were received today by the Diplomatic Corps, which immediately drafted a new note to the Foreign Office asking the Chinese Government how it reconciled its promise to procure the release of the foreign captives, with the events transpiring since that assurance.

Moscow, May 21st.—A despatch received by the Moscow Government from Leonid Krassin, the Soviet envoy now in London, it is reported, has convinced the Soviet that Great Britain is determined that propaganda in the Near East shall cease, or otherwise she will break off relations, which Moscow regards in the light of a disaster. It is considered probable therefore that the Govt. will repeat its denial relative to propaganda, promise to abstain from any such campaign and also recall its Eastern agents, in case Great Britain agrees to a conference on other questions, including De Jure recognition. The newspapers continue their violent abuse of Great Britain and avoid all other so-called capitalist countries, insisting upon no surrender. The Petrograd Soviet has adopted a resolution demanding a categorical refusal of the British conditions.

London, May 21st.—The physicians of Mr. Bonar Law this morning issued the following statement. "Mr. Bonar Law had a slight operation on the throat today. Otherwise his condition is unchanged".
