

Executive Order No. 10 1920.

1. Executive Order No. 14-1918 is hereby revoked.

2. In the future all prisoners discharged from Richmond Penitentiary, who have served for a period of six months or more shall be furnished with:

- 1 plain suit of clothes.
- 1 shirt and one cap or hat.
- 1 pair of socks and one pair of shoes.

3. Prisoners discharged from Richmond Penitentiary who have served therein one year or more shall hereafter also receive twenty five francs in cash for each year or portion of a year over six months that they were incarcerated in said penitentiary.

4. Prisoners discharged from Richmond Penitentiary who have served therein for a period of less than one year shall hereafter also receive such sum in cash as may be ordered by the Director of Police, but not to exceed francs twenty five.

5. The expenses incurred by virtue of paragraphs 2, 3, and 4, hereof shall be paid from "Maintenance of Police Department".

6. Such cash payment shall be made by check from the Despatching Secretary's office upon voucher signed by the prisoner being discharged, and approved by the Director of Police.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, June 2nd.—A conference including representatives of England, Belgium, Denmark, Spain, Holland, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland will meet in Paris on the tenth June, for the purpose of reaching a plan for joint action for the protection of the foreign creditors of Russia.

Paris, June 2nd.—The "Figaro" publishes an article by M. Jean Depiessac, describing in detail the work of the American Red Cross and the charitable institutions within its sphere in connection with hygienic and other conditions in France, including the fight against tuberculosis, the improvement and professional instruction in agriculture, and the reconstruction of villages.

Paris, June 3rd.—The "Matin" reproaches an article published by a newspaper at Laibach, containing the text of a compromise proposed by Signor Nitti, the Italian Premier, for the solution of the Adriatic problem. It stipulates that the boundaries of Venetia should be defined in accordance with the line drawn by President Wilson, but with some modifications designed to assure the defence of Trieste. Abbazia would remain a part of Jugo-Slavia, while Fiume would be placed under the sovereignty of Italy, the port being administered by the League of Nations, and the suburbs of Sassak would become Jugo-Slavia.

Italy would receive the islands of Lassin and Cherss, the other islands remaining under the Jugo-Slav, who would receive the whole of Dalamatia with the exception of Zara, which would be erected into an autonomous city.

Paris, June 3rd.—President Deschanel, accompanied by his family, left for the Chateau Montaille this morning.

Paris, June 2nd.—M. Millerand today received M. Avenol, the French representative at the Inter-allied Economic Council in London, and gave him definite instructions on the subject of economic negotiations with M. Krassin at which M. Avenol will assist.

Paris, June 3rd.—The aerobus "Goliath" in a recent flight reached an average speed of one hundred kilometres an hour. The first thousand kilometres were covered in eleven hours nineteen minutes, constituting a world's record.

Rome, June 3rd.—The Press states that the Italian commercial delegate in London will represent Italy in the conversations with M. Krassin.

Stockholm, June 3rd.—The Swedish newspapers report the arrival in this city, from Russia, of funds totalling seventeen million kroner, for the purpose of purchasing Swedish merchandise.

Paris, June 3rd.—The "Matin" learns from Rome that Signor Nitti has had a conference with Signor Bertolini, Chief of the Italian Delegation to the Commission on reparation in Paris, relative to Italy's share in the German indemnity, which she considers inadequate, as she did not participate in the division of the German colonies or fleet.

Paris June 3rd. Two Hungarian plenipotentiaries, charged with the signing of the Treaty, arrived here this morning.
