New Harding Memorial Stamp, Series 1923.

This stamp is on exhibition in the letter case at the local post office only with notice to the effect that same will be on sale on or about October 8th. As the issue of this stamp is limited only a small number will be available here while they last, and persons wishing them for souvenir or collection purposes should secure what they want as soon as they are placed on sale. The Harding Memorial Stamp is the same shape and size as the current 2 cent stamp and bears the portrait of Warren G. Harding within an oval and partly enclosed in a panel which is supported on either side by acanthus scrolls. Above the portrait within a curved panel appear the words 'United States Postage' in white roman capital letters. On a ribbon below the oval is the name 'Harding', and under this at the bottom of the stamp appears the words 'Cents.' In both lower corners within ovals with dark backgrounds is the white numeral '2'. In the upper left-hand corner appears the year of birth, '1865,' and in the upper right-hand corner the year of death, '1923'. The entire stamp is enclosed within a plain black border. The stamp is printed in black ink.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Toronto, Sept. 21st.—Subscription to the new Dominion of Canada refunding loan totalled \$58,000,000 tonight, exceeding the preliminary offering by \$3,000,000. Dealers in charge of the marketing of the government issue expressed complete satisfaction with the character of the response and predicted that the entire amount of \$172,000,000 required by the government to refund the 1923 Victory Bond issue, which matures November 1st, would be raised in Canada without difficulty. The reception accorded the issue to date is specially encouraging, in that formal offering to the general public will not be made until Monday next. As a result of the ready manner in which the \$50,000,000 of

bonds purchased by the syndicate has been disposed of, the Minister of Finance has authorized subscriptions to the amount of the entire issue. On Monday some 220 financial institutions including practically every bondhouse, stock exchange firm and bank in Canada with all their branch organizations throughout the dominion, will officially enter on the selling campaign. The loan made by the Dominion Government a year ago was entirely on a conversation basis, but in connection with the 1923 refunding loan, investors may purchase for cash or turn in their 1923 holdings in exchange. Outside of war time financing, the present offering represents the most important piece of financing ever undertaken in the Dominion. It was announced tonight that the metropolitan life of New York had subscribed for \$5,000,000 of the new loan. Special significance was attached to this subscription as it reflected an outside interest in the Dominion Government security.

Quebec, Sept. 21st.—The Premier, Mr. King, embarked aboard the C. P. R. liner "Montcalm" tonight for London, where he will represent Canada at the Imperial Conference. As the Premier mounted the gangplank he was given an ovation by the crowd which waited to see his departure.

Hamburg, Sept. 22nd.—A one hour general strike in protest against the increasing "pauperization of the working classes", was proclaimed today by the United Labour Federations of Hamburg, who passed resolutions also in favour of the abandonment of the "Ruhr adventure". They likewise demanded an increase in the unemployment doles and other remedial measures calculated to offset the growing depreciation of the currency. The seizure of gold and silver in private possession is called for in the resolution which sharply attack the Central Government and suggest that the workers undertake action regardless of its parliamentary legality.

Geneva, Sept. 22nd.—An appeal to the League of Nations to act on the reparations problem was made today by Mr. George Murray, representative of the Union of South Africa, in an eloquent address to the Assembly. The Kingdom of the Hedjaz, otherwise Arabia has applied for membership in the League.

Madrid, Sept. 22nd.—The King yesterday signed a decree abolishing the jury system in trials in Spain.

Paris, Sept. 22nd.—Martial law has been proclaimed throughout Bulgaria, according to a despatch received by the Bulgarian Legation here, which said it had received word that the Government at Sofia had decided to declare martial law throughout the country in order to prevent the spread of insurrectionary agitation. The Legation announced that it had received an absolute denial from Sofia of reports circulated abroad to the
