TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Sept. 7th.—Messrs. J. P. Morgan and Company as syndicate managers, today announced the terms of the new \$500,000,000 French Loan, a 25 year 8% external, gold obligation to run from September fifteenth next. The Bonds constitute a direct lien on the French Government which agreed to redeem them without reduction for any French taxes on or before September 15th 1945. A subscription book will be opened in New York next week at 100 and accrued interest.

Paris, Sept. 7th.—An official note today confirms the announcement of the arrangements made to get the Anglo-French Loan floated in the United States maturing October 15th. next. The note sets forth that France's half of the loan is being covered, to the extent of \$150,000,000 by "Transfers of gold of certain importance", and by exchange which the French Treasury has obtained, and the remaining \$100,000,000 by a loan on the American market.

Ottawa, Sept. 7th.—By virtue of a judgment which will be issued from the officers of the Board of Railway Commissioners, probably tomorrow, railway companies in Canada are granted an increase of 40% in Eastern Canada freight-rates and 35% in Western freight, effective

Monday next September 13th, and to continue in force until December 31st. After December 31st the increase in freight-rates in Eastern Canada will be reduced from 40 to 35%, and in Western Canada from 35 to 30%. Simultaneously with the increase in freight-rates, passenger-rates all over the country are advanced 20%, so long as they do not exceed four cents a mile. This increase is effective only to December 31st. After that date and for the six months period from January 1st to July 1st 1921 a 10% increase is authorized. Following July 1st, passenger-rates return to those in force at the present time. The judgment will authorize increases of 50% in sleeping and parlour-car rates, and an increase of 20% in the rate on excess baggage.

London, Sept. 7th.—Following is the result of the St. Leger, Galigula 1st, Silvern 2nd, Mantos 3rd.

Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 7th.—It is announced that the epidemic of Kaffir Pox is on the decrease.

Rome, Sept. 8th.—Scores of lives are believed to have been lost in the district north of Florence which was severely shaken by an earthquake yesterday morning. The territory violently disturbed seems to be of lozenge shape with Florence at the southern apex and Modena at the northern end. It extends along the coast and runs over the Apennines eastward for upwards of 100 miles. At Fivezzano, a town of 17,000 inhabitants near Carrara, almost every building was damaged and many were completely destroyed. Among the collapsed structures, is the Post Office in the ruins of which is the entire staff. Rivesno, Ferni and Montignone are reported in ruins, while in Marina and Carrara many structures have collapsed.

London, Sept. 8th.—Caligula 100 to 6 won today the great St. Legar Race, Silvern 8 to 1 was second, Manton 33 to 1 was third. The victory of Lord Wilton's Culigula was a great surprise to the racing public, but he has been consistently fancied by his stable since last June when he won the Ascot Derby Stakes of a mile and a half in decisive fashion beating among others, Orpheus, second favourite today. Caligula adds another victory to the long list of winners of the product of his famous sire, the Tetrarch. The failure of the favourite Spionkop was a great disappointment to the public whose faith in the Derby winner never failed. Sir Edward Hulton's Silvern and third favourite, ran into second place, while a rank outsider Lady Douglas Manton finished third. The result completely reversed the three year old form for the season.

Adelaide, South Australia, Sept. 8th.—Resolutions favouring prohibition were rejected by the Anglican Synod in Session here yesterday. During the debate on the resolutions one of the speakers, Reuter Walker, said "Prohibition is anti-
