open door for China was presented first by Mr. Hughes the text of the treaty followed closely and in some places identically, the language of the resolutions previously adopted on the subject by the conference. Without a word of discussion the treaty was approved on a roll call of the nine powers. A declaration by China to alienate a portion of the territory, was also put on the conference records. Then the Chinese tariff treaty was presented by Senator Underwood, Chairman of the committee that drafted it.

Dublin, Feb. 4th.—The re-assembling of the Dail Eireann which had been set for Feb. 14th, had been postponed until February 28th, it was announced by the Dail publicity department today. The change of date is in consequence of the postponement of the ardfheis or annual convention of the Gaelic League of Ireland from February 7th, owing to the threatened railway strike it was announced last night that the ardfheis would be held February 21st, with the possibility of a somewhat earlier date being fixed if the railway situation improved.

Dublin, Feb. 4th.—Southern Ireland stands for self-determination of those sections involved in the dispute over Ulster's boundary. This was made clear by Arthur Griffith in an interview in which he fully upheld that attitude of Michael Collins, head of the Provisional Government, in his recent conference with Sir James Craig, of Ulster. Against that part of Ulster which votes itself out of the Free State, we shall not use force, and against that part which votes itself thereinto we shall not permit unchallenged force to be used", Mr. Griffith declared. Mr. Collins represents the unanimous attitude of the provisional and Dail Ministry want not only peace, but brotherhood

with our at present divided countrymen. We seek for our nationalist people in the Northeast but the equality of Ireland's citizenship and we offer frankly and sincerely to our unionist fellow countrymen in the Northeast, the same equality. We are at the beginning of the birth of a nation and desire to sink the old distinction between unionist and nationalist in the common name "Irishmen", Mr. Collins when questioned regarding Sir James Craig reported statement that he (Collins) has changed his attitude, said, "I do not know of any reason why the Premier should have said this. I am as anxious for peace and understanding as ever. Sir James Craig made it clear to me in the interview on Thursday that he regarded himself as having been tricked by the British Statesmen. I made it plain to him that I appreciated his feeling on this point, and made it equally plain that on the question of boundaries there was no getting away from the written words of the treaty, on the plain interpretation of which I had taken my stand.

Rome, Feb. 5th.—Sunday passed without the election of a successor to the Pontifical Throne. Balloting by the conclave of cardinals continued today, both in morning and afternoon, but so far as could be learned without coming any nearer to the selection of a successor to Benedict than on the previous day. Word came from the Vatican yesterday that the three cardinals Marini, Pompili, and Bacilieri, who were suffering from influenza or colds had sufficiently recovered to take a personal part in the proceedings.

Edinburgh Scotland, Feb. 5th.—The announcement was made yesterday of the death of the Duke of Leinster, (Maurice Fitzgerald) sixth of his line and Premier Peer of Ireland. He succeeded to the title in 1893.

CITY COUNSEL FAVORS BEER AND WINE AMENDMENT.

Declaring that bootleggers are getting enormously wealthy and that the Government is losing revenue. Councillor Daniel W. Lane offered an order which was passed by the City Council, in favor of an amendment to the Volstead Act, to permit the manufacture and sale of beer and light wines.

"I believe that the country is not satisfied with the workings of this awful Volstead Act", said Mr. Lane. "The bootleggers are getting enormously wealthy and the Government is losing revenue. A tax we will say of \$1 a gallon on wine and 25 cents a gallon on beer would, in the course of ten years, pay all the bonuses that the former service men want and pay off all of the Liberty Bonds."

He cited the Cities of Chicago, Milwaukee, Baltimore, Cincinnati and St. Louis as passing similar resolutions. Eight members voted for the resolution. Councillor Egan was not present.

The resolution follows: "That it is the sense of the City Council of the City of Boston, in meeting assembled, that the Congress of the United States of America amend and modify existing prohibition laws under its jurisdiction and within its proper power which will permit the manufacture and sale and distribution of wholesale beer and light wines, and that all Governmental revenue derived from such permission be set aside as a separate fund for the payment of bonus to ex-service men."

The President of the United States Senate, members of the Massachusetts Legislature and the Speaker of the House will receive copies of the resolution.—*Boston American, Jan 24th.*
