U. S. NAVY PRESS NEWS.

January 11, 1920.

WASHINGTON: The House Naval Affairs Committee will report on the Navy pay bill tomorrow. It will probably come before the house for action Wednesday or Thursday. The bill as order-

ed reported to the House provides for a flat thirty per cent increase retroactive to January first.

CHICAGO: Illegal movement of liquor in Chicago has netted federal agents policemen and police over two hundred thousand dollars since July first according to evidence which it is reported has been turned over to Daniel C. Roper, Internal Revenue Commissioner in Washington.

NEW YORK: Department of Justice Agents yesterday filled an army motor truck with suspected communists arrested in Yonkers. The police of Yonkers aided the federal agents in serving deportation warrants on the men arrested.

RIO DE JANEIRO: The powder plant of Armour and Company at San Paulo was partly destroyed by fire Thursday. Damage is estimated to be about one million dollars. The plant which is said to be the largest in South America has been under construction for two years and was just about to be put in operation.

PARIS: Immediately after ratification of the Treaty of Versailles, Baron Von Leisner, head of the German Mission, made the following statement to the associated press: I am happy that peace has finally been effected. My greatest regret is that the only country with which Germany is still at war is the United States. I hope however that this situation will soon change.

January 12, 1920.

WASHINGTON: A number of democratic senators received telegrams today from William J. Bryan urging ratification of the treaty so the United States could enter the league of nations by the time the league council holds its first meeting next Friday.

NORFOLK: City sprinklers, railway cars and private artesian wells are being pressed into service today to supply Nor-

folk with drinking water. Unless there is heavy rain in the next few days a water famine will result. Allotment of five gallons a day to families is now necessary.

COPENHAGEN: A plan to scuttle the German warships not yet turned over to the allies is being considered by officials of the German Navy, according to information received by the majority socialist party leaders.

WASHINGTON: Rear Admiral James E. Tolfree, retired pay director in the Navy, died at Atlantic City, Saturday in his eighty-third year.

THE HAGUE: Five hundred Germans deported from Brazil have arrived at Rotterdam from Santos aboard the steamer "Avare."

NEW YORK: A Government campaign to combat the national unrest through the movies was launched yesterday at a meeting of prominent movie producers who were addressed by Secretary Lane of the Interior Department.

WASHINGTON: Establishment of an extensive naval base at San Diego, California, for the repair of destroyers, submarines and other small craft was urged today by Secretary Daniels before the House Naval Affairs Committee.

OKLAHOMA CITY: Physicians are puzzled over the cause of mysterious illness that suddenly became epidemic in Tulsa County. Five have died from the effects of the disease and five hundred are ill.

CHICAGO: Four hundred forty commercial planes were sold at the Aeronautical shop yesterday by one company for two million five hundred thousand dollars. The purchaser said they were to be used in the oil fields. Operators using them to reach new fields when a strike is made.

TELEGRAMS**ST. CROIX STATION.**

London, January 8th. Mr. Lloyd George and Premier Nitti left this morning for Paris where they will confer with M. Clemenceau. Mr. Balfour, Mr. Bonar Law, Earl Curzon, Mr. Edwin Montagu, Baron Birkenhead Lord Edmond Talbot and Sir G. Riddell are members of the Party. Signor Vittorio Scialoja, Italian Foreign Minister, with his staff, accompanied Premier Nitti. A British destroyer escorted their special steamer across the English Channel.

Madrid, January 8th.—Announcement was made late last night that a state of siege was proclaimed throughout the Province of Catalonia. The Minister of the Interior declared, at midnight, that Barcelona was calm and confirmed the reports that more than 300 arrests had occurred in consequence of recent outrages. The Minister added that the Government intended to take strong measures to put an end to the present affairs, the first step being to order the termina-
